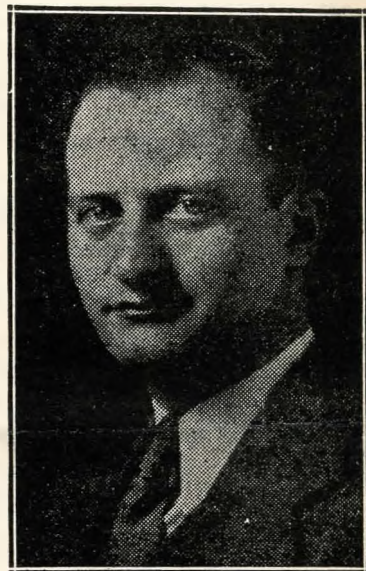

Hebrew School Survey To Be Conducted Beginning January 28

At a joint meeting of the Portland Hebrew School Board and the Executive Board of the Hebrew School Auxiliary, Mr. Charles Cohen, President of the Board, welcomed members of the Auxiliary who were present.

Reports were read by the Secretary, Mr. Samuel Cohen, and the Building Committee chairman, Mr. Aaron Davidson. Mrs. Benjamin M. Gordon, president of the Auxiliary, spoke on the aims of the newly reorganized Auxiliary. Mr. Jacob Rubinsky stressed the importance of maintaining and continuing interest in the development of the Hebrew School.

LETTERS AND ALL: The following is from the Philippines, Maury Golodetz to his uncle, Leo: "It's raining again and the mud is still deep. As much as we don't like mud and rain, we pray for it especially at night. It gives us a chance to get a little shut-eye. Yesterday I dug a fox-hole next to my cot. It's fairly dry and is very handy—from cot to fox-hole. I covered it with logs and sand to protect me in case of flak from our own gas. We still wash from our helmets (when we can) and save every can available to catch the water off the tent. It's rough going, but I'm getting used to it. There are plenty of Slant Eye Jap souvenirs, but I'm not gathering any of them. Firstly I like to travel light, and secondly, it is all ninth class junk. While I'm writing this, the boys are sorting out our daily rations—1 pack of cigarettes per day, 4 candy bars, tobacco, chewing tobacco, matches, razor blades, shaving cream, tooth paste, etc. Regards." (We got things to worry about, huh!!) . . . Mel Finn from England writes, "I haven't had the opportunity to visit London yet, but I have been to Bristol, England. You can't help getting the feeling that everywhere you go in England things are hundreds of years old. A church here just doesn't fit into the picture unless it was built in the year 1700 A. D. or something. The countryside is really beautiful and being here really makes you want to travel. Unfortunately, the PASS situation is unsettled, but even so I have seen enough already to know I am in England." (How's the scene (orita) situation there, Mel?) (Ed. Note: Hey, you, he's in England, not Spain.)

In a recent issue we printed Hy Jacobson's address in Texas. Henry Pollard in Italy noticed that it was right in the vicinity of his brother, Major Maurice Pollard. Henry wrote Hy and now Hy and Maurice are very close friends. (D'ya think Henry wrote and gave me this info? In the pig's eye he did. It came from Hy on his recent leave. When I do receive a letter from Henry it will be my first from him. And Henry, incidentally, is one of my bowling compatriots, and he does receive the "Bulletin.") Have been on the go day and night and there doesn't seem to be an end of it in view. Was on one of the first landing barges to make the landing here and we have pushed the NIPS about a couple of miles above ORMOC on ORMOC BAY

Mrs. Samuel Rosenthal To Review "Earth and High Heaven" For Hadassah Group

About 125 Hadassah members attended their regular meeting at the Center Tuesday afternoon to hear Mr. M. V. Malcom's views on Power Politics and Palestine.

Mr. Malcom has had considerable experience in Near East affairs and was very active after World War I in the attempt to obtain independence for the Armenians. He conducted hearings before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in their behalf. He also is the author of three books concerning Near East Political and Economic affairs.
