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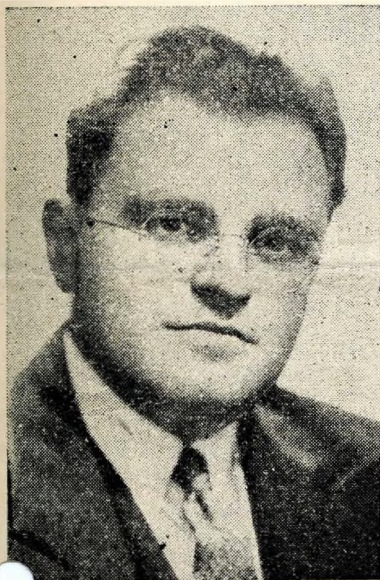

lecturer, who is considered one of the most original and brilliant thinkers in the Jewish ministry today.

Dr. Liebman is well known to many in our community, not only because he is the spiritual leader of Temple Israel in Boston, which is the largest Jewish congregation in New England, but also through his extensive radio work. Dr. Liebman is heard over N. B. C. National hookup on the Message of Israel program, also over C. B. S. station WBZ every other Sunday.

The Rabbi is also very active in inter-faith work in the Boston area. He is Chairman of Governor Winthrop's Commission of Clergymen, and also serves on the Governor's Permanent Commission of Religious and Racial Understanding.

Dr. Liebman was also the Charles W. Eliot lecturer at the Jewish Institute of Religion in New York City.

The public is invited to attend. Rabbi Aaron Greenbaum will introduce Dr. Liebman and Mr. Harold Nelson will be in charge of ushers.

He was superintendent of schools in many Maine communities and was a professor of education at Harvard. In 1939 he received the American award for distinguished service to American education.

Three very wise men met in the Crimea and produced a document that the people of the world will long remember and cherish. The "Big Three" are indeed great men. They have pushed aside minor differences to establish the framework within which people may live peacefully and with prosperity.

The American Dental Association is now the target of liberal groups and papers throughout the country. It concerns a report submitted by Dr. Horner of the A. D. A. to Columbia Dental School. The report suggested that Columbia limit its enrollment of certain "racial stocks." It is very encouraging to find that, at long last, liberal groups are going to bat for these minority students and attempting to clean up a very messy situation.

To those people who are dissatisfied with the Readers' Digest for its constant sniping at the Administration and the President, we suggest the new pocket size magazine "Readers' Scope." Its articles are far superior and, what's better, it doesn't try to shove "half-truths" down the throat as Readers' Digest often does. This was the case last summer, when their article on Palestine was ripped apart and refuted by Frank Gervasi of Collier's and Dr. Lowermilk of the U. S. Department of the Interior.

If you like to laugh, climb aboard the H. Allen Smith Band Wagon. He's one of the zaniest writers we know besides Artie Kober and S. J. Perlman. You start laughing from the moment you read the title and you don't stop until the end. His first two books were "Low Man on a Totem Pole" and "Life in a Putty Knife Factory." His latest release is "Lost in the Horse Latitudes." Incidentally, there's a synopsis of the latter book in this month's Omnibus magazine.
