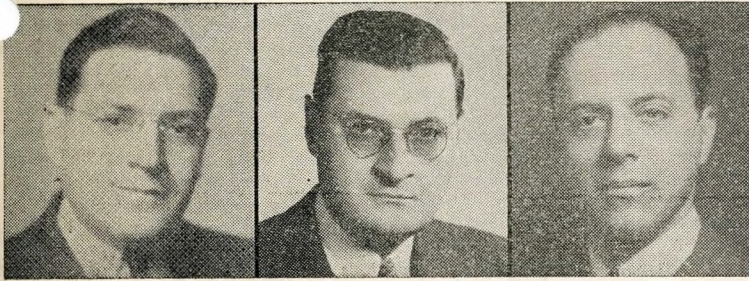

## "Our Program for Servicemen" Theme of USO-JWB Convention

Maine And New Hampshire Army  
And Navy Committees Meet Here  
Sunday For Important Conference

Mr. Israel Bernstein, Chairman of the State of Maine Committee, will preside at the luncheon conference of representatives of all JWB Army and Navy Committees of Maine and New Hampshire, to be held at the Center on Sunday, November 5th, at 12:00 noon.

In addition to Mr. Benjamin Rabinowitz, Executive Director of the Army and Navy Division of the National Jewish Welfare Board, will be the principal speaker of the meeting, this occasion will bring to Portland four other distinguished guests: Mr. Herbert Ehrmann, Chairman, First Corps Area; Dr. Samuel Kohs, of the Bureau of War Records; Mr. Louis Gitin, of Hospital Services; and Mr. Victor Taylor, USO-JWB Regional Supervisor.

Mr. Rabinowitz was director of the Jewish Community Center Division before entering the Army and Navy Division of the Jewish Welfare Board. At the time we were opening our Center, he was sent by the Jewish Welfare Board as Expert Consultant to set up the building and administration. He will be glad to see the progress that has been made since that time.

Since its organization, Mr. Herbert Ehrmann has been Chairman of the First Service Command Area of the Jewish Welfare Board unit of the USO, which includes the States of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Connecticut. Under his leadership, this Service Command Area has set the standard for high accomplishment in various phases of USO-JWB work.

Dr. Samuel Kohs, Director of the Bureau of War Records, is well known to Portland, often having spent a month with us to conduct the War Records Survey. His many

friends are looking forward to meeting him again.

Mr. Gitin has done outstanding work in military hospitals and has outlined our objectives and areas of service, with particular emphasis on the specialized program and practice which may be undertaken by the communities represented at the conference.

Mr. Taylor comes to the supervision of the USO-JWB work in New England with a wide experience in this field of endeavor. Before this emergency period, he was a professional worker in Syracuse, N. Y., where he was program director of the Municipal Recreation Department.

We welcome him heartily into our midst and we assure him of our continued cooperation.

The luncheon will be catered by the Pioneer Women's Organization.

### B'nai B'rith Hears Stimulating Address By Louis E. Sidman

B'nai B'rith had the pleasure of  
hearing from Mr. Louis E. Sidman,  
Assistant Executive Director of the  
New England Regional Office of  
the Anti-Defamation League.

Mr. Sidman's talk was not only  
interesting and educational, but  
was meant for each and every one  
of us and our fellow Jews.

I will quote in part a few par-  
ticular sentences of importance:

"The problem of Anti-Semitism  
in America is still as serious as it  
was prior to Pearl Harbor. A lack  
of understanding on the part of the  
masses of American people as to  
the basic principle of the American  
Democracy provides the back-  
ground for the growth of devious  
forces. We must bridge the gap  
between our attitude and our ac-  
tion."

When Mr. Sidman concluded his  
speech, questions were asked from  
the floor which enabled a few of us  
as guests to understand more  
clearly what Mr. Sidman was try-  
ing to convey to us. After clarify-  
ing his message, the meeting was  
adjourned.
