Rabbi's Message - Rabbi Sam Seicol

As I write this article, I do not yet know where I will be in the coming year. By the time you read this, I hope that I will. I know I will be providing High Holy Day services and working at times with the students at Emerson College. I also know I will be teaching some groups of Bridge students. Such is the professional life I accepted when I retired from full-time rabbinic service.

This is not only my world but also the nature of transitions in life. Unlike the creation of long-term and evolving relationships, which we often hope for and are more comfortable with, much in life is transitory and yet deeply fulfilling and meaningful. People come and go in our lives. Some touch us deeply and are an ongoing part of us for a significant period of time. Others touch us equally deeply but for a fleeting moment in the span of our years. Still others continue in a more superficial connection, whether for a short or long time, or as a connection on Facebook.

Whatever the level of connection to another person, Jewish tradition teaches us that we greet each person with "Shalom" and we depart with the same word. Thus the word has often been taught to mean hello and goodbye. Often we expand this simple translation of "shalom" to mean peace.

However, the word "shalom" does not actually mean peace. "Shalom" is not merely the absence of strife and enmity. It includes the concepts of much more: a well-being of spirit, a wholeness and sense of fulfillment in life, and a feeling of balance and deep satisfaction in relationships. "Shalom, it is good to meet/see you," when meeting or reuniting means, "May the time we spend together lead us to an enhanced sense of uplifting in our lives. May I find blessing in knowing you and you in me." The parallel use of "shalom" on separating carries the wish that I have been a blessing for you and you for me and the wish that there may be times again that we will say "shalom" as a greeting for further mutual enhancement and joy.

As we come to the end of June and say the "shalom" of departure to one another, let us seek to celebrate those blessings we have brought to each other. Each of you at Bet Ha'am has become a part of me in some way and you will go with me no matter where I go next. At the end of June, then, our words to each other will not be, "Goodbye, I will miss you!" Our words will be, "Shalom, I am glad you have been a part of me. You will always be in me and with me as I travel a path of life that seeks more shalom."

In the beginning of July, you and Rabbi Saks will greet each other with, "Shalom - how can we build more shalom in our years together?"

Let us learn not to say "hello" or "goodbye." Instead, in life's transitions may we always offer wishes for shalom.

From the Religious School Director

In the early 1800s in Germany, the Reform movement instituted the ceremony of confirmation based on the belief that a sixteen year-old is more ready than a thirteen year-old to affirm his Jewish identity. In 1846 Rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise officiated at the first confirmation service in the United States in Albany, New York. By the end of the 19th

century, the ceremony had become widespread in Reform communities. At first, confirmation was an alternative ceremony to bar mitzvah. In the 1970s, an increasing number of previously Orthodox and Conservative Jews, who wanted their sons and daughters to become bar/bat mitzvah, joined Reform congregations. And the bar/bat mitzvah ceremony was adopted by many congregations.

Reform leaders drew a parallel between the Jewish people's acceptance of the *Torah* at Mount Sinai and the students' acceptance of the role of Judaism in their lives. Thus it became customary to hold the confirmation ceremonies on *Shavuot*, the holiday that commemorates the anniversary of receiving the *Torah*.

Shavuot is celebrated on the sixth day of the Jewish month of Sivan, exactly seven weeks after Pesach. Shavuot eve will be Tuesday, June 7, and our 10th grade confirmation will be part of our Shavuot service. This service is a wonderful opportunity to support our youth and celebrate an important holiday.

Please see the invitation in this issue of Chadashot to join our students in celebrating their confirmation on June 7 at 6:30 PM.

We have used some of the funds for garden materials and will also develop curriculum materials to incorporate garden lessons into our religious school program.

Many thanks to the Moser Kittle family and Shai Levite who sponsored the spring mulching of our interior garden. What a luxury it was to stand at the sanctuary door and watch young, strong professionals do labor that so taxed our backs last spring. We will use the energy we saved to plant blue hydrangea and strawberry plants that we got at our annual plant sale.

Our Big Garden Day, chaired by Beth Simpson and Joanie Caldwell, was a big success on a rainy May 15. We raised \$1,168 from the sale of beautiful, donated plants. Someone even got a fabulous deal on a Japanese Maple! Thanks to Julia Bailin who photographed the day's activities, and todah rabbah to all who helped make our many accomplishments possible.

On that same rainy day, we also planted our wheat patch with several different varieties that include Emer, Einkorn, Jerusalem, Siberian Spring, Purple Barley and Glenn. Our fifth graders, Sophie Frantz, Ella Novick, Jonah Peterson, Elias Ruffner, Jonathan Stanley, Ella Stillman and Emma Tabenken did the planting,

supervised by Shai Levite, Dan Bailin and Brad Fox. They were even careful to label each type. Take a look under the fire escape as you come into our parking lot, and you will see our wheat as it grows! Wheat planting is a continuation of our Sowing Seeds Braiding Community program, funded by a URJ incubator grant.

Lunch and snacks were made available for all volunteers through the generosity of the Epstein family, Standard Baking Company and Panera. Thanks to Greg Levinsky and Oliver Watts for laying out a beautiful lunch spread and helping in so many ways that day.

Last year's plant sale profits funded the creation of our raised bed garden on May 15. Led by three members of Cultivating Community, Craig Lapine, Nora Saks and Ryan Green, the intrepid, early crew built three 18" high beds. They filled them lasagna-style, with layers of compostable material from our own piles and topped them off with rich, organic soil. The early crew included Russ and Josie Pierce, Alison Noiles, Dan, Henry & Charlie Noiles Gardner, Jacob Fogel, Stu and Louise Abramson, Brad Fox, Shai Levite and Toby Rosenberg.

At four o'clock our seventh graders and families arrived to plant the beds with seedlings and seeds. One bed is filled with herbs we can use for cooking or havdalah spices. Two larger beds hold squash, beans, tomatoes, peppers, lettuce/greens, potatoes, pumpkins, cucumbers, nasturtiums and more. It was wet and muddy but our volunteers dove in energetically to make speedy work of the planting.
