President's Message — Tim Boulette

For nearly two years, I have had the honor and pleasure of serving Congregation Bet Ha'am as its president. This is my last president's column for Chadashot. On May 24, at our annual meeting, our new president will take over. I will stay on for two more years as our immediate past president before stepping down from the Executive Committee and the Board.



Another highlight – one that I'll remember for a long time – was last September's 25th Anniversary Gala, ably organized by Alison Berman and a host of volunteers. Those of you who were able to attend know what a great time it was. The rest of you may just have to wait for our 30th!

Most recently, the Mystery of Matzah event, held last month, was a wonderful success. The weekend was centered on thinking about what we eat and where our food comes from and included fantastic matzah-making sessions - just in time for Passover!

Last March, Rabbi Wayne Dosick visited us for a weekend, thanks to the Rosalyn S. & Sumner T. Bernstein Scholar-in-Residence Fund. Rabbi Dosick's talks over that weekend about dealing with pain in our lives and our relationship with G-d inspired many of us.

But, as we must, we move forward. I could not be happier that we have found a wonderful new rabbi, Jared Saks, to serve as Bet Ha'am's sixth rabbi! Rabbi Saks officially begins in July. Of course, finding Rabbi Saks was the result of the monumental efforts of the Rabbi Search Committee, led by Elaine Falender, over the past months.

On April 10, 2010, Jewish music star Rick Recht appeared at Bet Ha'am, performing a wonderful concert. We had a fantastic turnout, with our own musicians and singers occasionally joining Rick on stage.

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Count and Make It Count — Rabbi Sam

What would you do if you were told that your bank account would be credited with \$86,400 each day? There would be several stipulations. \$28,800 would be withheld and placed in a special health and well-being account. Funds could be withdrawn from that account but there could be later penalty and interest charges. The second proviso would be that all funds not used at the end of the day would be forfeited. Each day would start with the \$86,400 balance. Money could be spent on any tangible item, donated to charities, gifted to others, or invested in personal enhancement and development. While there would be demands and requests from others (at times with additional inducements or attempts at coercion), you would be free to choose how to use your funds.

This may sound like a crazy system. Or you may be excited as you visualize all the ways you would spend your money. This is, essentially, the reminder we are given during the time between Passover and the day before Shavuot, the time of the Omer. The 86,400 we are given each day is the number of seconds we have to spend. We use close to one third of these for sleep and the rest are ours to invest and spend as we choose.

When the day is over, the time is lost to us and can never be used again. How we invested the time lives on in memories and life enhancements, as well as in regrets and feelings of guilt. We are therefore challenged each day to make the time we are given count.

We are instructed to count the days of the Omer from the second day of Passover until the day before Shavuot, a week of weeks. One reason for this counting is to help us strengthen our commitment to make our days count. Prior to Passover, we removed all chametz (leavened material) from our homes and thus symbolically from our lives. We are taught that we did so to let go of all that has spoiled or damaged our lives. As we entered into the new spring season, we prepared to create new and fresh habits.

For the seven weeks following Passover we count each day, reliving the journey our ancestors took that brought them from redemption to revelation. They journeyed from the shores of the sea to the foot of Mt. Sinai. Their newfound freedom during the exodus from slavery was cemented into a true sense of community and nationhood, bound by commitment to Torah. These weeks of the Omer are also a time for us to enhance and strengthen our connection to the time we are given as part of our Jewish community and our lives.

May we all grow in this time of the Omer. Let us learn to count each day so that we may better make each day count.

I would like to thank all of our dedicated teachers who – Sunday after Sunday – volunteer to teach our kids. We will have our special end-of-year Teacher Appreciation Luncheon after our closing events. More details are in the Religious School news.

The Mystery of Matzah was a Huge Success!

The weekend event began with Craig Lapine, Bet Ha'am member and Director of Cultivating Community, delivering a fascinating D'var Torah that encouraged us to think about the sources of our food and the importance of eating locally and in-season. After services on Saturday morning, almost 50 people joined us for a delicious luncheon followed by two engaging study sessions led by Elisheva Rogosa, our Scholar-in-Residence. In the first session, we learned about the origins of our wheat traditions and discussed food-source issues in smaller groups. In the second session, we had a dynamic conversation about how to grow wheat in Maine. Thank you to our participants for asking so many thought-provoking questions!

On Sunday morning, Elisheva led our religious school students and their families in three action-packed matzah-making sessions. Everyone was involved in mixing, kneading, rolling, pricking, and baking - all within the 18-minute time limit! After a yummy and bountiful luncheon, more than 50 people joined us for a discussion about matzah followed by another baking session. This time we used the same einkorn and emmer flours grown by our ancestors in biblical times. David Neufeld and his amazing brick oven cranked out as much matzah as possible, but there always seemed to be another one waiting to be baked! Luckily, we were blessed with a bright and sunny day, and the conversations in the baking line were lively and full of enthusiasm about growing wheat, upcoming Passover meals, and the celebration of spring!
