## A Message from Rabbi Saks

I remember seeing a t-shirt with two and a half apples printed on it. Above the apples were the words, "Three Reasons to Be a Teacher," and below the apples were the words, "June, July, and August." Of course, the image implied that among the best reasons to become a teacher were the summers off. But those of us who have ever been teachers know that the real reward is not in the time spent away from the classroom, but rather in the time spent in the classroom, with the students.

Some of my favorite moments have been opportunities I have had to interact with religious school students. I began teaching religious school while I was still in college. While on the educational staff at Jacobs Camp, I had a student write a postcard home that simply said, "Today I played soccer. Lunch was okay. *SHIUR* [our lesson] ROCKED!" In rabbinical school, I had the privilege of teaching fifth grade in a synagogue in New York City. One of my students asked me, "If we don't know how to pronounce God's name, how do we know it's not pronounced like any of the words we use? Shouldn't we be careful with all of our words, since any of them could be God's name?" And since becoming a rabbi, I have had the good fortune, in particular, of teaching B'nai

Mitzvah and Confirmation students during these times of important Jewish life cycle events.



Perhaps there's a special place in my heart for being in a classroom. My mother and father are educators, both now retired. My entire childhood existed within the framework of learning and of teaching. I heard stories of my parents' students and the joys that my parents experienced in their years of teaching. Though I may have inherited a love of teaching, I know that I would still cherish opportunities to impact the lives of students even if I were not the child of teachers.


There is a lesson in the Talmud in *Sanhedrin* 19b that tells us whoever teaches another person's child is rewarded by Jewish tradition as though the child were his or her own. Baruch Sienna writes, "We owe our parents our lives, and this is a debt that can never be repaid. But the teacher who changed our life, who inspired us, and helped us find meaning, also shares our eternal gratitude."

So important is the mission of teaching that the Talmud says, "If a person goes looking for property lost by a parent and lost by a teacher, the teacher's takes precedence over that of the parent. Because even though the parent brought that person into the world, the teacher, who

taught wisdom, brings that person into the World to Come." (*Bava Metzia* 33a)

Our Religious School is sustained by volunteer teachers who give of themselves to change the lives of our students. Over the course of the past school year, I have had the privilege of working closely with B'nai Mitzvah and Confirmation students who each reached a significant Jewish milestone because members of this congregation taught them. Each year, there are teachers who retire or step down from their positions in our Religious School. Each year, we need new teachers.

Please consider becoming a teacher in our Religious School next year. If you don't think you know enough about Judaism to teach, don't worry. Orly and I will help you. *Pirke Avot* says that anyone who teaches a single section, a single rule, a single verse, a single expression, or even a single letter is to be treated with respect and honor. If you teach, you'll afford yourself a great opportunity to learn more about Judaism and, perhaps more important, to learn from your students.

## A New Way to Begin Friday Night Services

Bet Ha'am's newly re-formed Membership Committee spent its first meeting discussing how we can strengthen our welcoming atmosphere so that we're poised to welcome new members while continuing to make our community warm and inviting for existing members.

We considered a variety of ideas and identified six we want to begin working on. Rather than outlining them all in this short space, I want to focus on one. We'd be interested in your feedback.

We've proposed to the Board and Rabbi Saks that we change the way Friday night services begin. Instead of filing into a slowly filling sanctuary and waiting quietly, we recommended gathering in the social hall for some conversation and light snacks. Then, when it's time, we could all go into the sanctuary together.

This is a beloved tradition at many other synagogues. It would give us a chance to come together as a group before services begin. When we enter the sanctuary, we would have made connections with one another, rather than choosing a seat while looking at the backs of the heads of those already in the room. We would be more likely to sit with others we've met, rather than just with those with whom we came (if we came with anyone). Those arriving at our outdoor courtyard and looking through the wall of glass would see a warm, brightly-lit social hall with people chatting and *noshing*, rather than a dark, empty room.

We think that, for those in the social hall, waiting to enter the sanctuary would build a positive tension, an anticipation of welcoming Shabbat. When it's time for services to start, the rabbi would begin a *niggun* for us to sing together before we enter the sanctuary.

Of course, anyone who wants to spend a few moments alone in the sanctuary before services could still do so.

We met with Rabbi Saks and President Lisa Pierce to present this idea. Rabbi Saks suggested a name that he's seen used at other Reform synagogues, *Kabbalat Panim*, which is Hebrew for Welcoming Faces. We think the name fits very well.

We organized our first, experimental *Kabbalat Panim* on Friday, May 4. About 75 people came and seemed to really enjoy it. We feel this merits extending the experiment, so we're continuing to hold *Kabbalat Panim* each Friday evening, beginning a half hour before the start of services. Meanwhile, we'd like your feedback on this initiative. Please call me at 797-2395 or email me at szanton@maine.rr.com to let me know your thoughts. A sunny Mothers' Day was the perfect backdrop for our third annual plant sale. Bet Ha'am members and friends generously donated hundreds of plants dug from their gardens. We also sold a six-foot ginkgo tree, exotic miniature orchids, mint dug from our raised beds and *etrog* seedlings started at our *Tu B'Shevat seder*.

Committee members Beth Simpson, Laura Kittle, Julia Bailin and Toby Rosenberg, along with an energetic team of volunteers, made the day a delightful success. Thank you to Cathy Breen, Annette Lemek, Claire Payne (Julia Bailin's mother), Jane Weinstein, David Caldwell and Oliver Watts for their help. Kudos to co-chairs Beth Simpson and Joan Caldwell for great event planning. Thanks to Karen Silverman and Julia Bailin for photographing the day's activities. All the gardeners who so generously gave plants and all the customers who bought them helped us raise \$1035.

We saved some of the unsold day lilies and blue fescue grass to plant around Bet Ha'am. The few remaining plants were donated to the South Portland Land Trust plant sale.

In other garden news, our wheat under the fire escape is growing. The species planted last fall are tall in the back rows and the spring wheat is quickly filling out the front row. Take a look!

And the weeds are growing too!

The Committee has set every Tuesday, from 5:00 PM until dark or tired, for weeding. Members of the Committee will work, give advice, and support everyone's efforts. On the third Tuesday of each month, committee members will get volunteers started on weeding and then conduct the Garden Committee meeting.

Some Sunday weeding sessions will also be scheduled. Keep an eye on the weekly e-mails for announcements of these dates.

Some of our experienced volunteers choose to weed independently at their own convenience after getting approval from committee members. Ruth Higgs and Cathy Breen can often be spotted in the garden doing just that!

Karen Silverman and Stephanie Cummings have generously embarked on a project to document the plants and weeds in our sanctuary garden in photographs. We will use these photographs to compile laminated guide books that will help volunteers distinguish between our plants and the weeds that need to be pulled.
