A Message from Rabbi Saks

For many, *Purim* is a children's holiday filled with carnival games, costume parades and more than one's fill of hot dogs and *hamentaschen*. As with most things Jewish, though,

Purim is so much more than childish frivolity. The celebration of Purim is rooted in telling the story of the Book of Esther, which recounts the Jews' escape from disaster on the 15th day of the Hebrew month of

Adar, a day chosen when the villain Haman cast lots (purim in Hebrew) to determine when to kill the Jews.

The Book of Esther is the only book in the Hebrew Bible that does not contain God's name. While one perspective is to see God's hand at play by reading between the lines, the absence of any mention of God allows us to turn the ordinary on its head on Purim. The costumes, the parades, the reading of the Megillah and even the overconsumption of alcohol are all meant to help things go the way they typically don't, with a lack of formality and an overabundance of frivolity.

In his book *The Jewish Holidays* (which I'd highly recommend as a great resource for understanding all of the Jewish holidays on a deeper level), Rabbi Michael Strassfeld examines the notion that the story of Esther is meant to be

farce. The historicity of the Book of Esther is questionable on many counts, but its farcical nature is clear. Rabbi Strassfeld writes, "Perhaps the first hint of the story's farcical nature is in

the first chapter when the king and his advisers decide they have to get rid of Queen Vashti in order to keep all the wives in Persia obedient to their husbands. What could be more farcical than a group of men issuing a decree that

they must be obeyed by their wives?"

The comedic nature of the story and the twists and turns it takes its dramatic reachina where conclusion, Esther reveals herself as a Jew to her bumbling husband, Ahasuerus, are all features of this first Purim parody. Almost halfway through the year from Yom Kippur, our most solemn holiday, Purim is a time to let loose, to make fun of ourselves and to masauerade as something we are not. Edward Greenstein points out, "It is not often noted that the precedent for masquerading on Purim is set by the Scroll of Esther itself. Esther the Jewess dresses up like a queen, and Mordechai takes on regal garb. See the Jews dressing up like Persian royalty!"

Too often, we focus our celebration of *Purim* on the children's enjoyment. But *Purim* is important for adults too.

When was the last time that you let loose? When was the last time you didn't act your age? Remember how good that felt? I hope you'll join us for our Purim festivities this year, which awkwardly fall during February vacation. What's the saying? Man plans; God laughs. Well, we can laugh, too, God. We can laugh too. On Sunday, February 24, we'll have a brief Megillah reading at 10:00 AM, followed by a Purim carnival. I encourage you to come and act your shoe size, not your age.

Join Us for a Shabbat Meditation Service


Judaism has a long tradition of meditative practices. Our ancestors and sages knew that cloaking prayer in diverse forms offered opportunities to encounter The Divine.



Tikkun Olam: Protecting our Environment - both Globally and Locally

For me *Tikkun Olam* is an important Jewish value that encompasses not only welcoming the stranger, feeding the hungry, caring for the sick and sheltering the homeless, but also, and crucially, caring for the environment that God created for our survival and the survival of all living things.

We are taught that God declared, "Look at my works! See how beautiful they are, how excellent! For your sake I created them all. See to it that you do not spoil and destroy my world, for if you do, there will be no one left to repair it." (Ecclesiastes Rabbah 7:13) Caring for the earth may seem intangible to some of us. We can make it tangible by realizing that each person is responsible for 21 tons of carbon pollution that will not disappear for a hundred years.

The issue of tar sands is a local and tangible threat to our communities. News stories have announced that Exxon plans to pump this very thick, toxic substance through an old pipeline (under very high pressure) to South Portland. Transporting tar sands through pipelines creates a threat of spills into the environment. Tar sands are heavy, consisting largely of clay and sand, making cleanup incredibly difficult. The pipeline that would be used crosses the Crooked River, which leads into Sebago Lake, six times. A spill could endanger our fresh water supply, pollute Casco Bay, and endanger our fisheries. Exxon plans to burn off some of the toxins from the tar sands near Bug Light in facilities with 70-foot chimney stacks and then ship the product to other countries for further refining. This process could affect the health of those living near these facilities.

We can take action to protect our communities, the air we breathe, the water we drink and the planet earth for which we are responsible. On January 26, some of us joined in a protest march and rally from Monument Square to the Maine State Pier. What better way could there be to celebrate *Tu b'Shevat* than protesting the potential destruction of the Canadian Boreal forests and the threat this pipeline would bring to our environment?

On March 11, there will be a City Council workshop at the South Portland Community Center. South Portland residents can express their concerns about the renewal of Exxon's permit to build the chimney stacks and pump house for the tar sands project. City Council members will be considering whether to allow Exxon to proceed. If you live in South Portland, I hope you will participate, express your opinion and help to protect our environment.
