A Message from Rabbi Saks

The first time I set foot in Israel was for my first year of rabbinical school. I expected that it would be a travel experience like any other. Boy, was I wrong! I arrived at Ben

Gurion Airport knowing no one. Then I traveled to my hostel in Jerusalem's Old City, where I stayed until my classmate and I found an apartment. Walking through the ancient alleyways of the Old

City, I found my way to the Kotel, the Western Wall, and, in the afternoon sun, pressed my forehead against the ancient stones. I could feel the sun's warmth radiating off the stones, almost surrounding me, and immediately I realized that this was a place like no other.

Over the course of that year, I began to experience the wonder of Israel and to fall in love with life there. By explaining the context of the news stories my family was seeing at home, I realized that Israel was so much more than the headlines reported in the United States.

Even when it was barely halfway through the week, I would hear people greeting each other with "Shabbat Shalom!" knowing they wouldn't see each other again before Shabbat. Though I didn't understand all of the Hebrew on the signs, there was power in

being surrounded by the language that filled my lips with words of prayer back home.

As we traveled through Israel during that year, I had the

opportunity to encounter the many layers of a simultaneously ancient and modern country. From standing at the excavation of the southern steps of the Temple Mount, knowing that two thousand years ago our ancestors walked those steps to worship God,

to touring the Golan Heights and learning about how Israel miraculously succeeded beyond what was thought possible in the Six Day War, to being in the hustle and bustle of Tel Aviv and learning of Israeli innovations that have improved life around the world, including top-notch medical research, cellular phone technology and drip irrigation, I learned what Israel is really about. And I realized that really the only way to understand Israel is to be there.

During my year in Israel, my family came to visit. My mother returned after three decades away, and my father and brother visited for the first time. I saw the amazement in their eyes and knew that I wanted to share that with others. I eagerly looked forward to taking others to Israel to see its wonders with their own eyes.

This is why I want you to join me in Israel next year. I have been working with Arza World to plan a congregational trip to Israel from February 13 - 23, 2014 and I want you there with me. Shavuot: More Than Blintzes and Cheesecake

"Your people will be my people, and your God will be my God."

These words from the Book of Ruth are traditionally read on Shavuot. As the first person to convert to Judaism, Ruth makes a conscious commitment to Jewish life and practice when she throws in her lot with the Israelites. How many of us have had the opportunity to make that choice in a thoughtful way? As Rabbi Braun points out in Rebecca Wohl-Pollack's excellent short movie, The Jewish Community, there are Jews by chance and Jews by choice. Each of us makes the choice about living Jewishly.

In my own life, I see this as an open door. I am a Jew by the chance of my birth. And often I am also a Jew by the choices of my actions.

Each year at Shavuot we get to confirm our faith in God and our commitment to Judaism as we re-enact receiving the Ten Commandments at Mt. Sinai. It is – or it can be, if we choose – a time of introspection and optimism. It probably is not a coincidence that this holiday happens in our springtime, as the world around us is filled with renewed life.

And as we consider our own spiritual renewal, we also celebrate the future of the Jewish people with the thoughts and views of the next generation. Our *Shavuot* service combines both of these priorities for the holiday. This year's



confirmation class will lead our Erev Shavuot services and share their reflections on being Jewish as they consider their own

commitment to Judaism.

As a teacher, this service is always a highlight for me. Having watched many of the kids in our congregation grow through our religious school program, I feel proud as I witness the interesting young people they have become. As I watch and listen to them, there usually is at least one student who surprises me with a depth of insight or a level of passion.

Some of these students will go on to study in our 11th and 12th grade program, some will lead Jewish lives at home or at Bet Ha'am, and some will continue to wrestle with their relationship to Judaism. But each has the capacity to inspire us as we ask our own questions: Who am I? What is my purpose? What is my relationship with God and with Jewish life?



Social Action Committee News: Bet Ha'am Represented at Maine's Gun Bill Hearings

Rabbi Saks and I traveled to the State House on April 8 to speak on behalf of two bills (LD 1240 and LD 267) that would strengthen Maine's gun legislation by requiring universal background checks on gun sales. I was proud to be there with our synagogue's spiritual leader, and proud to be speaking on this issue in my final act as chair of the Social Action Committee.



So many people came to testify for and against the bills that they filled three waiting rooms as well as the main hearing room. We waited $5\frac{1}{2}$ hours for our turn to testify.

I have cared deeply about preventing gun violence my entire adult life. In 1975, I was held up twice at gunpoint, once in a terrifying incident when a robber entered an apartment where I was visiting a college friend. Shortly after that, I took an investigative journalism class and spent a semester delving into the politics of the gun issue in my home state of Connecticut, home of weapons manufacturers such as Colt.

In the years since then, I covered the issue as a reporter in several states, served on the board of a Maine group working to prevent gun violence and made a documentary film about a Lewiston woman's effort to get a bill passed that would require a waiting period before Maine youth could buy guns. I have seen a dramatic shift in the national debate during those years. In the 1970s, we were discussing bans on handguns. Now, the question is whether to place any limits on military-style weapons and magazines that can hold 50 or more bullets.

I often despair that we have made so little progress – and, in fact, have loosened laws despite the carnage every year from gun violence. But state and national polls show that the public wants politicians to act to strengthen our gun laws and make our country safer. If we speak out, sooner or later we can change the political debate. Connecticut politicians showed us how that can happen, even in a state once known as an NRA stronghold.

Reform Judaism has been at the forefront, pushing for measures to limit gun violence. I am proud that our synagogue is part of that effort.



Strategic Planning Update

After more than ten months of research and information gathering, the Bet Ha'am Strategic Plan has begun to take its final shape. A broad consensus on a vision for the congregation's future has emerged from congregation meetings and the 288 responses to our congregational survey. The research and discussions of our nine study circles have helped to identify innovative practices from across the country, and suggest ideas that speak to the particular needs and circumstances of Bet Ha'am. The Strategic Planning Team and the Board have integrated all of this information and begun the final phase of the process - drafting the strategic plan document.

The draft of the emerging plan outlines the congregation's vision in four interconnected parts: Torah/Lifelong Learning, Avodah/Worship and Prayer, Kehilla Kedosha/Holy Community and Yesodot/Foundations. Within each of these areas, the plan will identify specific goals and implementation steps. The Strategic Planning Team discussed a preliminary outline draft of the plan in mid-April and then presented the draft to the Board at its meeting on April 30. During the month of May, the Strategic Planning Team will continue to work with the Board to refine and articulate our congregation's vision and implementation strategy.

Our goal is to have a draft of the Strategic Plan ready for discussion with the congregation at the upcoming Annual Meeting. In the interim, the Strategic Planning Team continues to welcome your ideas and suggestions. 







Garden Committee's 4th Annual Plant Sale
