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UPDATE FROM THE RECONFIGURATION COMMITTEE

Over the summer, this new Committee was formed to focus on the current roles of our professionals and to determine how best to meet the needs and priorities of Beth El members as the professional team is reconfigured. The Committee came into existence following the end of Cantor Ross's tenure at TBE when it became clear that the synagogue would no longer be able to afford to employ three full time religious and educational professionals: a Rabbi, a Cantor, and an Educational Director. Our goal was to determine how a new configuration could be developed that would serve the multitude of congregational needs while being fiscally responsible and having realistic expectations of the professionals who serve us.

A Committee drawn from a broad range of Temple members has been meeting since the fall to gather information and develop recommendations for presentation to the Board later in the spring. Members include current committee chairs, past presidents, Board members and those new to Temple committee service. The following are the members of the Reconfiguration Committee: Hedy Cohen, Norma Filler, Melissa Finberg, Judy Gatchell, Joy Krinsky, Robert Levine, David Miller,

Sam Novick, Dan Skwire, Olivia Solodar, Norman Wilson, and Ellie Miller, chair.

Since the fall, we have met with Rabbi Braun, Avis Smith, Anita Bernhardt, Treasurer Linda Jacobs and Assistant Treasurer John Brier, all of whom have helped us review congregational input provided through surveys and meetings. We also reviewed data from the Alban process. We have been guided to a better understanding of the educational needs of our families by our Hebrew School Committee's participation. We have reached out to talk with other congregations about their structure and have asked for information from the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism.

Rabbi Braun helped us focus our initial discussion and once we refine the list we are developing of essential functions, she will again join us to help shape the recommendation we will be presenting to the Board.

As often happens when a new group forms, old ideas are looked at in new ways, and new ideas are expressed and developed. The process is helping all of us to focus both on members' needs and essential synagogue functions. We are all fully engaged in this important process and look forward to discussing our recommendations later in the spring.

CAJE Brings People Together

It is not very often that I receive mail. It is even less often that I receive a letter. So, you can imagine the joy I felt today when I came home and found that I had received a letter from my friend, Tohar. Tohar isn't just any friend. She is my CAJE friend. As I read the letter I was as joyful as the bright orange paper to have heard from her.

I met Tohar this past summer at the CAJE (Coalition for the Advancement of Jewish Education) Conference. I went with my mom to the conference, which was in St. Louis, MO. Tohar and I were in Bogrim together, a program especially designed for 7th-9th graders. We were a group of about 15 students who participated in some of the sessions offered at the main conference, met with educators and performers, and spent time together as Jewish teens from all over the USA. Our homes ranged from California to New Mexico to Michigan to Maine. Some were children of clergy, some of the parents were presenters at the conference, and some of us, like me, were children of other conference attendees.

We first met in a small room with long white tables. I was a bit apprehensive at first, looking around and seeing that some kids already knew each other and I was one of the few 9th graders. I admit I was embarrassed when I realized that I was one of the only people with a red ribbon displaying that this was my first CAJE. I whispered to the girl next to me, "How many CAJE's have you been to?" "Only a few," she replied, "But that was when I was little so I don't remember them." I let out a sigh of relief. I wasn't the only person who had no ripe memories of CAJE. We got to talking and I found out that she was in 7th grade and from New York. I, being two years older, was worried that she would not want to befriend such an "elder." I'm so glad I was wrong!

Later that evening there was a kick-

off to the CAJE program with music and a speaker. The Bogrim were told to sit together. Not knowing another soul I sat next to the 7th grade girl from before. During the program we became friends incredibly fast. We discovered that we had so much in common. We both love musical theater! We had so much in common that I thought to myself, "Is 👟 she Jewish too?" Thinking about the number of anti-Semitic people in this world and how few Jews there are, I decided it would be best not to say anything. Then I realized, "Of course she's Jewish! I'm at a Jewish conference!" I told her what I had almost asked her. We laughed and all of my previous worries about our potential friendship vanished and we could not stop talking the entire night. I couldn't wait to see her the next day.

The next morning began 4 days full of learning, adventure, fun, and excitement. The only problem was that I could not remember my new friend's name. As hard as I tried, I could not make her name stick in my head. We spent from 8:30 AM to 5:30 PM together in Bogrim and even did some evening activities together, but I still could not remember her name! It finally stuck after we exchanged cell phone numbers. My mom and I spent a lot of time with Tohar and her parents. We ate meals together and on the last night we went to look at the St. Louis Arch together. It was hard to believe how close we had become in just 4 days.

Not only did CAJE bring Tohar and me together, it also brought me closer to others from Temple Beth El. By spending so much time with my mother, we became much closer and understand each other much better. Seeing a familiar face in a crowd of hundreds of "CAJE nicks" during mealtimes is quite a relief. I looked forward to telling Avis and Roger everything I had done that day and loved hearing about their adventures.

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
