Big Increase In Federation Special Gifts

Enthusiastic advance gifts solicitation meetings in all divisions of the Jewish Federation Campaign have produced substantial increases over 1949 gifts, according to an announcement by Barnett I. Shur, Chairman.

A capacity group of inspired women, responding on May 1 to the appeal of Mrs. S. Alexander Bralove, National Chairman of the Women's Division of the United Jewish Appeal, led off with total gifts aggregating a 24% increase over 1949. Mrs. Maurice Levine is Chairman of Women's Special Gifts. Mrs. Harold J. Potter is Women's Division Chairman.

But it was not until May 4 that the story of the 1950 campaign was told. On that evening, Mrs. Archibald Silverman, substituting for Abraham Feinberg, stirred sixty-five top donors in the community to an inspired demonstration of gener-

osity. The totals produced \$101,000 in gifts as against \$90,000 in 1949, for a 12% increase.

"I don't need a welcome home," Barnett I. Shur told his well-wishers that evening. "The newcomers in Israel need it. Give it to them with your dollars."

Louis Weiner, campaign vice chairman, Louis Bernstein and George I. Lewis, Special Gifts Chairman, produced a welcome for Israel and for all of the beneficiaries of the 1950 campaign such as has seldom, if ever before, been witnessed in this community.

Continuing the trend of substantial increases over 1949, a group of youth-adults, assembled on May 7 to hear Harold Katz, produced pledges totaling 33% more than received from the same group last year. Buddy Goodman, Chairman, and Sumner Bernstein, Special Gifts Chairman, distributed cards and urged that they be completed within a week.

On May 8th, the advance gifts section of the Men's Division performed a feat which guest speaker, Barbara Lawrence, acclaimed as the most remarkable she has witnessed in five years of campaigning. Prodded into action by card-caller, Leonard Carp and co-chairman Arnold Goodman, forty-one men announced pledges of \$6,300 as against \$4,800 for an increase of 31% over 1949. And what is even more remarkable, every pledge represented an increase over last year's gift.

Jewish Education Survey Is Conducted In Portland

A distinguished group of educators consisting of Dr. Aharon Kessler of the American Association of Jewish Education, Dr. Abraham Millgram of the United Synagogue Commission on Jewish Education, and Isador Margolies of the Mizrahi National Education Committee have conducted a survey of the Jewish education system in Portland.

The survey is sponsored by the Jewish Federation in cooperation with the Portland Hebrew School and Temple Beth-El, who have

agreed to accept as binding any unanimous decisions of the surveyors.

The survey culminated months of serious examination by the Jewish Federation into problems confronting the Jewish community in the area of Jewish education.

It is expected that the survey report, which will be available shortly, will produce recommendations designed to promote the cause of Jewish education, in its varied aspects, in Portland.

Beth-El School Registration Set

Registration for Temple Beth-El Hebrew School for the new school year will begin on Monday, May 15 and continue until Friday, May 26. Children who will have attained the age of 7 years by October 30, or whose ninth birthday is not later than June 30, will be eligible to register for the opening class in September.
