HARRY BROWN

Well Known Citizen and Bath Merchant Dies at His Home

Harry Brown, 62, a well known merchant at 183 Front street for a quarter century, died Friday morning about 11.30 at his home, 2 Pearl street, following an illness of three weeks and which had been acute since Sunday night.

A native of Russia Mr. Brown left that country when a young man to go to England where he remained for some time and then came to New York. He was a tailor during his younger years and was in Brunswick before coming to Bath, working there for the father of the late Alphonso Snow of Bath, and upon coming to this city about 33 years ago first worked for Mr. Snow. He was a member of Lincoln lodge of Odd Fellows, was one of the founders of Beth Israel and helped build the temple on Washington street. He had also served in the city council. He possessed an optimistic, social and happy disposition and in this way won a large circle of friends. He was successful in business ventures and was said to have amassed considerable property.

Mr. Brown was the last member of his family and is survived besides his widow by a bright family of children that includes three daughters, Bessie, Mary and Minnie Brown all at home; two sons, Arthur Brown of the Atlanta Freight Tariff Bureau who only arrived from Atlanta, Ga., Thursday, and David Brown, a freshman at Yale.

The funeral will be Sunday and flowers must be omitted.
