SOLOMON K. GREENBLATT

Well Known Bath Tailor Dies Thursday After Long Illness

Sblomon K. Greenblatt, 74, a well-known Bath business man and one of the last of old time tailor craftsmen, died Thursday morning at his home, 233 Washington street.

Born in Lithuania, March 20, 1880, he was a son of Harry and Anne Leah Greenblatt.

On Aug. 27, 1907, in Boston, he was married to the former Goldie M. Kyetsky, who died last March 23. Soon after their marriage, they came to Bath to reside.

Mr. Greenblatt had been in the tailoring business in the block at Front and Arch streets since 1914. In 1926 he purchased that business block. While he had moved several times, in the interim period, his establishment had always been located in that immediate area.

A charter member of the Beth Israel synagogue, Mr. Greenblatt was one of its builders. He was also a member of Polar Star Lodge of Masons and Montgomery and St. Bernard, Royal Arch chapter.

Surviving him are four daughters, Mrs. Isadore Singer of Bath, Mrs. Saul Levine of Brooklyn, N. Y., Miss Ada Y. Greenblatt of Bath and Mrs. Morton Berman of Eastport; three sons, Abraham E. Greenblatt and Isear W. Greenblatt of Bath and Owen L. Greenblatt, an aviation cadet stationed at Ellington Air Force Base, Houston, Texas; a brother, Peter Greenblatt of Boston; five sisters, Mrs. Mary Aranowitz of Boston, Mrs. Abraham Libman of Nantasket, Mass.; Mrs. Barney Gordon and Mrs. Hyman Goldberg of Dorchester, Mass., and Mrs. Samuel Escott of Boston; eight grandchildren, also many nieces and nephews and grandnieces and grandnephews.

Services were conducted at noon Thursday in Beth Israel synagogue. Friday, chapel services were conducted in Portland at 12 noon by Rabbi Morris Bekritsky. Burial was in the family lot at Mt. Sinai cemetery, Portland.
