Hillel in Maine

The B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation for the State of Maine is now serving the largest number of Jewish students in the history of that organization. Its program of cultural, social and religious activities reaches more than 100 students in the three units, located at the University of Maine, Colby College and Bates College. Rabbi Milton H. Elefant, former chaplain, is the new director of the Hillel Foundation in Maine.

Rabbi Elefant reports that Hillel activities on all three campuses are attracting a goodly number of the Jewish student population. Several social gatherings and many cultural meetings have been of great interest to the students. The breakfast discussions are favored by the Hillelites at Colby and Bates Colleges, and the unit at the University of Maine has also responded heartily to the delicious breakfasts.

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR . . .

Dear Sir:

It is indeed gratifying to note that you have again made it possible for our Jewish community to use the Community News as a medium to air its views concerning communal affairs.

I was particularly interested in Hendric Burns' query "Why are the Jews of Bangor praying to 'one God' in four different synagogues?" I would like to assure Mr. Burns that his question is not at all "naive". If it were, the solution to the problem would be equally as simple. Throughout the years many of us vitally interested in the preservation and progress of Jewish life in our community have often asked the very same question. However, little or no progress along this line is evident, and it remains for Bangor Jewry to seek out and effectuate a type of communal organization which will insure the positive evolution of our people.

The religious division of our ethnic group is merely a symptom, and to eradicate the symptom would only be a temporary allevia-

tion, at best. Primarily, in my humble opinion, the reason for our failure to establish a "kehillah" on a firm and sound basis may be listed as follows:

1. The complexity of our organizational set-up
2. The insufficiency of professional leadership
3. The heterogeneous Jewish population
4. The too inclusive program

Religious organization in our community is limited by the intense individuality of the congregations and their mutual competitiveness, factors which promote separateness and intra-Jewish conflict. A synagogue council would do much in the direction of cooperation. Such a body would demonstrate possibilities toward self-development, the promotion of mutual interests and the development of contacts with comparable Christian bodies. Should religious organizations move apace, and provide a sound base of content, they can make an important contribution to Jewish education and to other cultural developments within the Jewish group and aid largely both in internal and external group relations.

There is a crying need in our community for a central democratic organization that will unify our people by cutting across the various religious groupings and social and economic levels. The establishment of a Jewish Community Council patterned along lines already functioning in

several enterprising cities would no doubt be the answer to our present administrative chaos. One of the reasons for the establishment of such an authority in Bangor would terminate the lack of democracy in those organizations in control of Jewish affairs. Accusations have been leveled at certain central bodies that they are controlled by a few influential persons rather than by the total community.

All committees and central agencies of the Jewish Community Council should be composed of as wide a representation as possible from the affiliated organizations. The Jewish community at large should be kept informed of all Council activities at frequent intervals so that understanding and discussion of all issues will ensue. The functions of the present Community Center Board, the Directorate of the Hebrew School, and the Jewish Welfare Federation, could be combined into one body thus eliminating administrative duplication and much valuable time would be saved. Subcommittees of the Council would be charged with the responsibility of maintaining the Center, Jewish Education, and fund raising. Other functions such as Ritual matters, public relations and ethics, adult education, and vital statistics should also be directed by the Council.

on the subject of Palestine.

Several Hillelites of the University have offered to accept leadership of Young Judaea groups in Bangor and are awaiting the call of the community.

The social events are held in the Bangor Jewish Community Center. An occasion of interest was the all-state affair held in Waterville, Sat. Nite, December 13th, where Hillelites of all three colleges gathered in Chanukah social festivities.

Hillel in Maine has been fortunate in receiving two foreign students; Peter Schwartz who attends the University of Maine and Michael Kessler-Guberman who is at Colby College. Both have maintained excellent records in their respective schools and are a source of unusual information and great inspiration to their fellow students.

Rabbi Elefant states that the Hillel work has been very gratifying in the heartening attitude of the students toward Jewish problems, in their avid interest in Jewish activities and in their honest and sincere approach to all Jewish matters.

The Jewish community is the reflection of Jewish life. A thriving, well-ordered Judaism will produce an integrated, responsible forward-looking communal organism. It is incumbent upon all elements of Jewry to unite in this common effort, on which may depend, to a large extent, the ability of Bangor Jewry to survive and to make a distinctive contribution to human civilization. The Jewish Community Council, although a relatively new form of cooperative action, may with strong and far-sighted leadership be the answer to this vexing problem of disunity in our houses of worship.

Lack of space prevents a more minute presentation of the Council Plan, and I would welcome the opinions of our readers concerning such a proposal.
