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CHANUKAH

In the fourth century B.C.E., Alexander the Great conquered Asia and the Middle East. His conquests paved the way for the fusion of Greek culture and eastern tradition, which became known as Hellenism. Wherever the tentacles of Alexander reached, the Hellenistic culture was adopted either entirely or at least partly.

During the second century B.C.E., Antiochus the Syrian king who then ruled over Israel, was determined to institute a full program of Hellenization among the Jewish people. In the year 167 B.C.E. the Maccabees revolted against Antiochus and in the year 165 B.C.E. they were victorious. The holiday of Chanukah thus commemorates the overthrow of Hellenization in the land of Israel.

Why, the question might be asked, were other countries and cultures able to adapt to the Hellenistic culture while the Jews were not. One interesting answer is given that other cultures and nations either substituted their deities with those of the Hellenistic culture or adopted some ways of the Hellenistic culture while still holding on to some of their own. In other words, they added some things to their religion while at the same time they deleted others.

The Jewish people however, could not accept any other deity side by side with the Almighty in heaven, for that in itself would be a desecration of g-d. Though the Torah has 613 commandments, just by adding one or subtracting one, not only would this be sacreligious, but it would create a change in the entire Torah. It is not a question of adding one new law to the others or deleting one, but it would thus cause a change in the entire Torah. It would not be the "Jewish Torah"; it would be a new religion.

Today in our day and age, Judaism is facing somewhat the same threat as it faced during the time of Hellenism, however, with one difference. During the time of the Syrians the threat was from without and from within. Today, it is only from within our own ranks. We must understand that deleting and adding to the Torah does not merely constitute a few changes in some of the laws, but it causes a complete metamorphosis, whereby the Torah is not the same Torah from Sinai.

May the lights of the menorah illuminate the hearts of all our brethren so that Torah Judaism may continue to remain the cornerstone of our faith.

LAWS CONCERNING THE KINDLING OF THE CHANUKAH LIGHTS

1. Beginning with Friday evening, December 10th, the Festival of Chanukah commences. Every night for eight nights the Chanukah lights are kindled.

2. Each night an additional chandle is added; the first night, one; second, two, etc., exclusive of the Shamesh.

3. The lights are kindled left to right, so that the traditional light of each night is kindled first. (The candles are placed in the Menorah from right to left.)

4. The candles should be placed on the window sill in order that they may be seen from the outside.

5. Before lighting the candles, the blessings are made. On the first night we recite three blessings and on the following nights, only the first two blessings. On Friday evening the Chanukah candles are lit before the Sabbath candles.

LAWS PERTAINING TO PURIM

1. Thursday, February 24th, is "Tannith-Esther" - "Fast of Esther".
Saturday evening, March 26th, and the following morning of the Purim day, the Megillah (book of Esther) must be read.

It is obligatory upon all, both male and female, to hear the reading of the Megillah.
2. On the day of Purim, everyone must observe "Mishloachmonos" -- sending a gift of at least two kinds of edibles to at least one friend.
3. On the day of Purim a special Purim Feast should be celebrated and everyone should rejoice with the wonderful miracles of Purim and be inspired by it.
