Maurice Samuel Speaks At Center Sunday

Federation Delegates Gather For Annual Session December 12

Every Organization To Be Represented At Important Supper-Meeting

Mr. Abraham S. Levey, president of the Jewish Federation, has announced that the most important event in the calendar of the Federation will take place on Tuesday evening, December 12th, when delegates, representing every member organization, come together for their annual meeting. Highlighting the gathering will be the presentation of one of America's most distinguished personalities in the field of community organization, whose name will be announced in next week's "Bulletin."

Among the vital business matters to be acted upon by the delegates are: election of a board of 45 members, important constitutional revisions, and planning for the future expansion of the Federation.

Details of the meeting will be reported next week.

Jacob Cousins Post Aux. To Hold Membership Tea

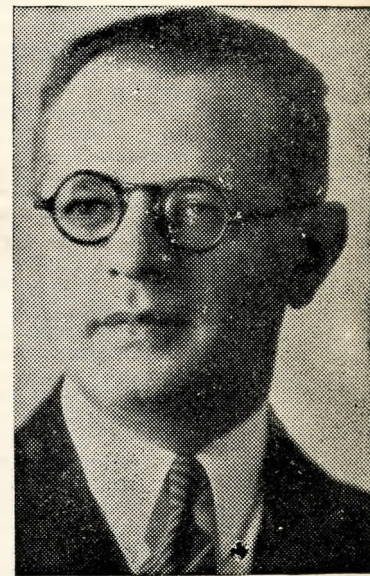

FLOTSAM

(We have been asked to forego our regular column to give an account of Mr. Miller's appearance along with our impressions.)

A capacity audience came to the Center Monday evening to hear Chester Miller give his answer to the question, "Is Telepathy Real?" At the conclusion there seemed to be two schools of thought among those present. The majority were very interested but highly skeptical, while the other school was represented by the elderly man who came up to me and said, "It's good, but for voss tagt es?" Whatever the opinion, everybody had a fine time and was provided with a good topic of conversation for a couple of days—a happy omen of things to come in the Center Forum.

Mr. Miller opened his performance by briefly defining mind and memory. He followed the new Behaviorist line, "which has great importance in the fields of medicine and psychology." "Memory is nothing more than a fusion of all our sensory experiences." (Sounds like something out of Egyptian hieroglyphics.) For example (the example is ours), the senses that we know as seeing, hearing, touch, taste, are the basis of our memory. Experiments in psychology have shown that if 100 people are put in a banquet hall and later asked to tell all they remember, 90% will describe what they have seen, 5% what they heard, the remaining 5% will remember in terms of the various odors, or the feel of utensils. The inference is that most of us have highly developed visual memories, whereas among musicians we find a great ability to remember sounds. The important factor is that it is a question of training and memory by any sense can be developed.

Thus, in the first half of his program, Mr. Miller demonstrated a high degree of development of his visual sense—he astounded the audience by memorizing Collier's (chosen at random by Mr. Wernick) while simultaneously memorizing 25 objects listed by the audience, and including such unrelated words as Haig and Haig, candelabra and heliotrope.

The second half of his program he devoted to showing his prowess outside the ordinary senses—called extra-sensory proportion or mental telepathy. This is Dunninger's field and the subject of much research at Duke University. This also was the part of the program that raised much skepticism in the audience.

"Whitey" Potter was asked to draw any simple design on a blackboard. Then, with his back turned, Mr. Miller received the alpha and gamma rays from Whitey's brain (or whatever impulses mental telepathists receive), scribbled on another board, and lo and behold, the same symbol.

Then Bud Cohen, Abe Elowitz and Al Yorra were asked to list a city, color and movie actress, respectively. With their slips safely in their pocket, he took the pad, asked them to concentrate, and wrote his message on a pad. He threw the wadded paper into the audience to be verified. The slips tallied on both sides—Kalamazoo, yellow and Shirley Temple.

The Piece de Resistance of the evening was when he had a young lady call a mile northeast of the Center to ask a man to name any card in the deck. When she returned, she named the "seven of clubs." He then took a deck of cards and showed one card to be facing the wrong way—it was the seven of clubs. Furthermore, the back of the card was a different color. He self-admittedly "had placed the card there 12 hours earlier," proving his ability to communicate with minds far away.

After the performance, we had a short interview with Mr. Miller. We told him that we didn't think he had answered the question, "Is Telepathy Real?" He said that he left it to his performance and let people feel as they may. He also offered \$10,000 to anyone showing him to be false.

We then asked what telepathy involved. "It involves the conscious mind," he parried. Since we had learned that consciousness involves the mind's awareness of the present moment, we asked him if telepathy only involved communication at the present moment. He said, "Yes," and that he could not predict the future like the clairvoyant tea-leaf readers. We thanked him and concluded the interview.

Now comes our brief with Mr. Miller. We still do not believe that telepathy is real. How, if as he says, he cannot predict the future, was he able to place the seven of clubs in the deck twelve hours in advance of the telephone call. Telepathy involves only the present. If that is not calling the future, we'll eat all the tenses present, past, future, and a couple of pluperfects to boot. Anyway, it was swell entertainment and we still think Mr. Miller has got plenty on the crystal ball.

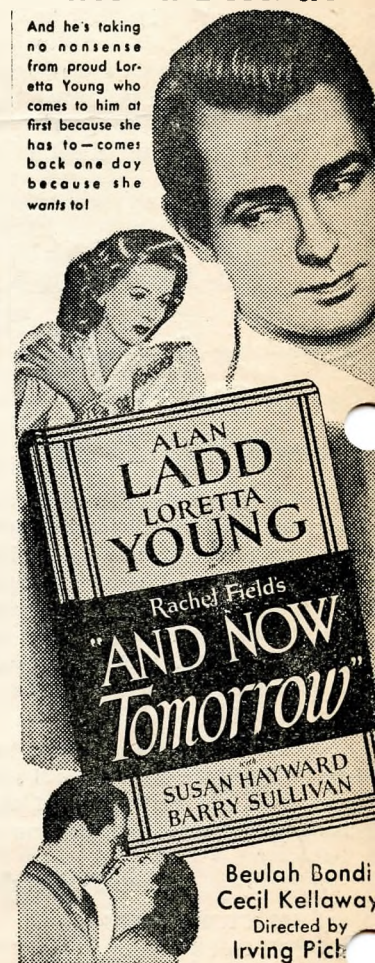
