"Donor" Goal At 284 Mrs. Anna Blumenthal and Majors Accept Unit Quota of \$15,214

Two hundred and eighty-four Donors at \$36.00 each, and a grand total of \$15,214.00, was the high goal accepted by Mrs. Anna Blumenthal, Vice-Chairman of the Women's Division, at

the Rally Wednesday evening, April 18th. Stressing the need for every woman pledging herself to be a donor, Mrs. Israel Bernstein, who presided, said: "Every woman who under-stands will, and should, make every sacrifice to add her name to the Honor Paul of Women Danaus. It means only 100 a day and when you think what Roll of Women Donors. It means only 10c a day, and when we think what these pennies will do to save lives, and to build our community at home, we cannot say no.'

Presidents of each of the organizations which are beneficiaries of the Federation agreed that the success of this year's tremendous campaign depends in a great measure upon the Women's Division going "over the top.'

Women contributors will be honored again this year by having their names inscribed on the Women's Donor Honor Roll; tribute will be paid to these women at a special event in their honor.

Recognition Of Service When Service Was Needed

Sgt. Sidney Levine of Portland, son of Mrs. Mark Levine of 151 Congress Street, Portland, Maine, has just returned from thirty-nine (39) months of service, an unusually long record and one of the very first boys who left Portland to enter the service, who has been actively engaged in the Southwest Pacific for such a long period of time.

Sgt. Levine was attached to a Division which was formed overseas, and was one of the first to land on Guadalcanal, which was the first island invaded by our troops against the Japanese. He saw action on Bougainville, on Leyte in the Philippine Islands, and also at New Hebrides. He was the first Portland Jewish boy to go overseas and was attached to the 182nd Infantry, Co. "L". He is known as one of the few attached to the AMERICAL" Division.

He has returned to this country and is slated to go to a rest camp at Lake Placid, New York. He is one of our unsung heroes, and as Chairman of the War Records Board for Portland, we welcome him back.
