Spurred into action by the tragic news of flood disaster in Israel which have made 90,000 immigrants homeless, the Jewish Federation has proclaimed Sunday, Jan. 29, C-Day in Portland.

On that morning between the hours of 10 and 12 o'clock, two hundred eager workers will descend upon the homes of each and every contributor to the Federation campaign. They will make a determined effort to turn pledge balances into cash to provide shelter for thousands of men, women and children who are being exposed to unbelievable hardships in the flooded, muddy immigrant camps of Israel.

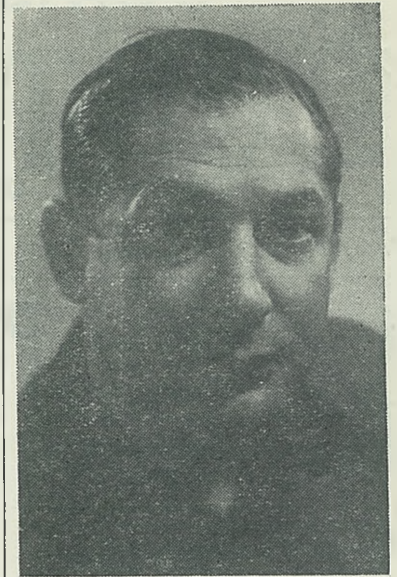

# Christian Minister Speaker For C-Day Breakfast Jan. 29

John Stanley Grauel, a Christian minister who served as a volunteer crew member aboard the world-famed illegal immigrant ship "Exodus 1947" will be the guest speaker at a C-Day Breakfast being tendered to C-Day Workers on Sunday Jan. 29 at 8:45 a.m. in the Jewish Community Center.

Following his inspiring message, some 200 men and women will leave with assignment cards in hand to visit personally every contributor to the Jewish Federation who has not yet paid his or her pledge. A determined effort is being made to turn pledges into cash to meet the tragic needs of our people in Israel.

A writer, lecturer and radio commentator, as well as a churchman, Mr. Grauel made a dramatic report to the United Nations Special Committee on Palestine concerning the British naval attack on the Exodus and the subsequent sufferings of the 4,500 refugees aboard the immigrant vessel.

A devoted supporter of Israel, Mr. Grauel is now touring the United States, bringing to thousands of people the story of Israel's heroic struggle to build a new, democratic state in the Middle East and to welcome and resettle the hundreds of thousands of homeless refugees who are pouring through its gates.

This young Christian veteran of

the Jewish struggle for justice has just returned to this country following an extended visit to Israel and to the Algerian refugee camps for homeless Jews. He is a brilliant and forceful speaker who brings to his audiences a moving, eye-witness story of Israel's immigration, up-building and development as it looks today.

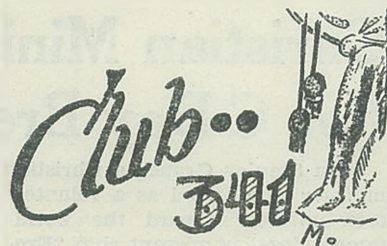

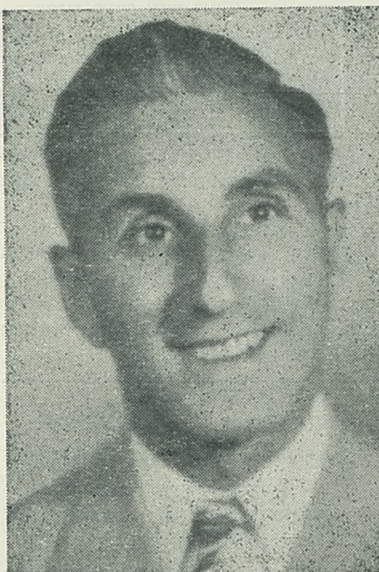

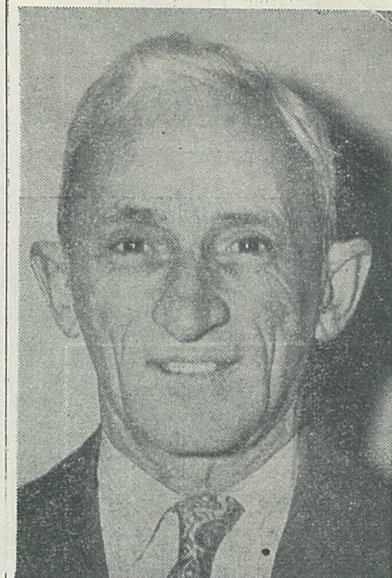
