Godfrey Camp **Fund Increases**

The Norman I. Godfrey Day Camp Fund continues to grow. Before the Bulletin printed the notice that the scheduled dinner had been cancelled, a warmly worded telegram and a check for \$100 were received by Fund Chairman Harold P. Nelson from Frances and Louis Altman of Stamford, Conn.

Mr. and Mrs. Altman are the brother and sister-in-law of Mrs. Ethel Godfrey, widow of Norman. Their telegram said:

"We are deeply touched by your community's tribute to Norman. You could not have chosen a more fitting memorial than associating his life with children and their needs. We can't be with you in person but our hearts are filled with affection for all of you who knew, understood and loved Norman so

"May we join with you in this understanding. Check for \$100 follows."

Miss Ruth F. Fennessey, executive secretary of the Portland Council of Social Agencies, sent a check for \$15 for the Day Camp Fund.

Her letter said:

"This money was given through the Group Work Division of the Council of Social Agencies and through Social Workers' Club at the loss that was felt deeply by both clash to determine whether freedom

Rabbis Declare Passover Is Real Holiday of Freedom

RABBI EPHRAIM BENNETT * * *

"In every generation one ought to regard himself as though he had personally come out of Egypt (Hagaddah)."

Freedom, by its very nature, is something which cannot be bestowed upon future generations. Each generation, in turn, must define and endeavor to preserve its concept of freedom. By means of the Seder service, the Jew dramatizes this fact, for the Seder emphasizes the eternal struggle which rages between the forces of tyranny and liberty for the possession of the souls of men and nations, and within man himself. The Seder is a re-dedication to the ideal of freedom and an expression of our determination that "next year we shall continue to be free."

Certainly, for us who are living in an age which finds the world divided into two mighty and hostile segments, each girding its loins and time of Norman Godfrey's death, a mustering its strength for a final

RABBI MORRIS BEKRITSKY

The holiday of Passover which we celebrate this week is one which is deeply ingrained, not alone in the ideals of Jewish life but in the ideals of all democracies, for Passover is the holiday of freedom.

There is a difference between the ideal of freedom as the Torah understood it and the ideal of freedom as it is popularly conceived. The world at large has understood freedom as a negative concept. It interpreted freedom as being only the absence of servitude. Take away the master and the slaves are automatically free.

The Jew has understood freedom as being more than an abolition of servitude. Freedom is something positive. It is a concept and a state of mind. Freedom is the raising of the individual from an inferior condition in life to a superior position. Freedom was coupled with an ideal of the dedication to holy values.

When Moses came to the Children of Israel to preach his message of freedom he not only told them in G-D's name that "I shall free you from the labor of the Egyptians"

but also that "I shall take you unto
me for a people and I shall be your
G-D." Freedom meant an entire
change in values. It meant looking
at life from a different perspective.

The American Civil War which saw the manumission of the negro slaves, did not liberate them. In essence they still remained as slavish as they were before Emancipation Proclamation. A fiat decree cannot bring freedom. Freedom, to be real, must be coupled with values which are positive and real and elevating in life. The Children of Israel, taken from Egyptian slavery, were immediately led to Mount Sinai and dedicated to new and higher values. It was then that their liberation was complete and perfect.

There are people in the world today, who, while not serving any human masters, are yet psychologically slaves. They are slaves for they have no ideals and no values and no purposes by which to guide them-

Council To Hear Dr. Louise Ames

Everyone is looking forward to hearing Dr. Louise Bates Ames speak at the Council meeting Tuesday, April 4, at 2:15 p.m. at the Center.

Mrs. Ames was graduated from Deering High School in 1925 and the University of Maine in 1930. She received her Ph.D. from Yale in 1936 and since then has been on the staff of the Yale Medical School. She has been personal research assistant to Dr. Carroll Gesell since 1933.

She is now Curator of Yale films on child development and assistant professor at Yale Medical School. Her publications include a dozen films and forty published books and articles. Some of the books in which she collaborated with Dr. Gesell are "The first 5 years of life," "Infant and Child are the culture of today," and "The Child from 5 to ten."

Mrs. Ames is working on the study of adolescence and the use of the Rorschach (ink blot) test.


