Community Meeting Draws Large Crowd to Discuss Problems and Solutions

No one knew quite what to expect as 112 men and women gathered in the Epstein Room at Beth Israel to have a frank and open exchange of ideas about tensions within Bangor's Jewish community. After nearly three hours of lively discussion, most agreed that the evening was well spent, especially if the process

begun on June 4 results in a more active, friendly and respectful community.

The events of June 4 were actually set in motion many months earlier, when the Board of the Jewish Community Endowment Associates voted to find and pay for a consultant who could assist community leaders in lessening tensions and finding

ment Associates (who intend to publish a summary of the responses later this summer). Perhaps most significant was the response to question 54: How would you characterize relations among the Jews who live in the greater Bangor area? Fifty-four percent of the people answering said that these relations could be much improved.

These feelings were further explored when Dr. Reisman came to Bangor in late March to meet with the leaders of all the Jewish organizations and congregations in the city. After a tiring but productive day, Bernie recommended that the Endowment Associates proceed with plans for a community wide meeting.

A Planning Committee consisting of representatives from all three congregations, the JCC, and the Endowment Associates, met several times to plan the details of the unique meeting. The response was very gratifying, as more than 100 adults from Bangor and beyond came together, first in small groups, and then in one large discussion. Dr. Reisman proved masterful at keeping us on time and on target; he was ably assisted by about a dozen discussion leaders.

Three broad topics were covered on June 4: the causes of current tensions within the Bangor Jewish community, suggestions for resolving those tensions, and an evaluation of current Jewish organizations in Bangor. In small groups at different tables, every individual had a chance to comment. There was only time for a few tables to report to the entire group, but every table was asked to provide notes to Evelyn Silver, who has summarized them for the future work of the Planning Committee and the Jewish Community Council.

Although these ideas are too numerous to list here, there seemed to be consensus that the Jewish Community Council needs to be revitalized and, perhaps, restructured; that the leadership of the three congregations should meet regularly; that there must be more joint programming, particularly for the children in the community, but also for singles and other adults; and that communication must be improved, because lack of communication results in distrust.

June 4 was both an end and a beginning. The community wide event marked the end of Bernie Reisman's assistance and the process funded by the Jewish Community Endowment Associates. However, June 4 is just the beginning of a "grass roots" effort to find the commonalities among the Jews of this region and to increase opportunities for us to learn and play together.



"March of the Living"

Julie Kirstein, daughter of Jerry and Jo-Ann Kirstein, participated in the "March of the Living" this year.

The "March of the Living" began in 1988. It is a program that takes teenagers from all over the world on a 3 kilometer march from Auschwitz to Birkenau, which was the same march that led thousands of people to their deaths in the gas chambers during the Holocaust.

The "March of the Living" was founded by the American Zionist Youth Foundation in New York and was designed to keep the memory of the Holocaust alive among young people.

As part of the application process, Julie had to submit an essay, which follows.

"March of the Living"

Since the beginning of Judaism and our patriarch Abraham's finding of G-d, Jews have been walking. In the book of Genesis G-d tells Abraham, Lech, Lecah, "Go from your land, the place where you were born to the place that I will show you" - that place is now of course, Eretz Israel. After slavery in Egypt for two hundred and ten years, we walked as a people through the desert to the land that G-d promised to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. After the building of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem, we walked three times a year during the Sholosh Rigolim to pay homage to our creator. After the destruction of the First Temple, we sat and cried along the shores of Babylon waiting for that moment when we could walk back into a rebuilt Jerusalem. With the destruction of the Second Temple, we walked for nearly two millennium throughout the lands of Diaspora until we were able to walk back into the Promised Land. Why then, is it so important for young Jews, who live in freedom throughout the Diaspora and in Israel, to walk through the ashes, the rubble, the blood and the tears of killing centers that we remember today as concentration camps? And why is it important to continue that walk to the land of Israel? Isn't it enough to go to Hebrew school, synagogue and Jewish cultural events? Can't we survive by just supporting these financially?

Our whole future, however, cannot continue unless we connect ourselves to the lessons and the rich heritage of our past.

My participating in the "March of the Living" provides me

with an opportunity to strengthen my binds to my G-d, my people and my family. It allows me to observe and celebrate with my fellow brothers and sisters the joys and anguishes of the past into new hope for a secure and promising future.

This "March of the Living" happens to come, on the Jewish calendar, at a most appropriate time in the year. The march follows right after the holiday of Pesach. It is at the Seder table that we will tell the story of our exodus from the bondage that we knew in Egypt to life and freedom in the Holy Land. The Haggada tells us that in every generation we have a responsibility to see ourselves experiencing the Exodus from Egypt. The Haggada continues by telling us that in every generation someone rises up against us to destroy us. As a people, the "March of the Living" helps put in perspective the modern day Egypt — the Holocaust that our families in this generation have experienced.

As a third generation Holocaust survivor this March, more than ever, places me in a position to experience the most recent Shoah — the persecution and the pain that the Holocaust inflicted on European and world Jewry in general and my family in particular. My father's parents are Holocaust survivors. My grandmother, of blessed memory, lost her entire family, with the exception of one remaining sister, to Nazi atrocities. It was the first day of the Sukkot holiday, when she, as a young woman, watched in horror and witnessed from the woods as her family and other Jewish families in the small village of Vevya, (near Vilna in Lithuania) were machine gunned to death by the Nazis and pushed into mass graves that they were previously forced to dig. Her march, as she fled on foot, saw the death of her husband and young daughter and her imprisonment in a Soviet work camp. My grandfather, who is now eight-seven, may he live to one hundred and twenty, with the exception of one remaining brother in Israel, lost his entire family to the death and denigration of the Lodz ghetto and the incomprehensible exterminations at Auschwitz. My grandfather walked in the death march from Auschwitz to Birkenau and then onto Dachau. Although near death and weighing sixty pounds at the time of his liberation, he attributes his survival to his trust and faith in the Almighty. My birth and existence in this world and my participation in the march is an affirmation to myself, my people and the world that Hitler, Yimach Shimoh, did not succeed.

Out of the ashes of the Holocaust, the death marches of Auschwitz turned into a life march with the rebirth and the establishment of the State of Israel. Walking head high and shoulder to shoulder with brothers and sisters from the world over bears witness to the world that the people of Israel live!

The Sisterhood of Congregation Beth Israel will soon be distributing the form letters for our Annual Yom Kippur Yizkor Booklet.


