

Sunday was a day of unparalleled beauty and joy for 43 club members who attended the barbecue at the Adelman home on Kenduskeag Avenue.

Hot dogs and hamburgers with all the trimmings are served, plus punch and cake. "It's always a big reunion of all old-timers who greet each other like long-lost friends," Wilde said. Many are in wheelchairs or handicapped.

"Some have had heart attacks, others are sick, and some hardly venture out anymore. But they do come to the barbecue. It was just beautiful, with a lovely breeze and wonderful mu-
