TIKKUN OLAM— REPAIRING THE WORLD

There's been much talk about **Tikkun Olam**- repairing the world, but one really has to ask oneself two questions:

- 1) Why must we repair the world?
- 2) How do we repair the world?

When Hashem (G-d) created the world, He left certain things unfinished and appointed man, the guardian of the world, with the job of completing the work. In order to accomplish our mission, we can either use a willy-nilly method of guessing how to repair it or we can study the instruction booklet, the Torah, and learn exactly how to do it.

When I was a young boy, I remember my bike wheel was wobbling. My father explained that the reason the wheel was wobbling was because some of the spokes were either too loose or too tight. He worked with me to find the problem spokes and using his trusty spoke tightener, I balanced my wheels. Throughout the whole process he explained what needed to be done and carefully guided me through the process. That is exactly what Hashem did when He presented us with His Torah at Mount Sinai. Hashem gave us the blueprints (Torah), explanations (Oral tradition-Talmud) and guided us through the process.

Therefore, it is up to each one of us to delve into the Torah and discover the most efficient method needed to properly do our job of Tikkun Olam.

EXPERIENCE THE RABBINATE

Did you ever wonder what Rabbinical school was like? Well, if you have, have I got the deal for you. Every Sunday, Beth Abraham has a full schedule of learning. Each class goes into depth, insuring that we understand the text and then we attempt to apply it to our present day, may it be sections of Jewish law or Jewish philosophy. Each class is interactive and questions, discussion and participation are the norm. Everyone is welcome and no previous knowledge, including how to read or understand Hebrew is required. Each class is also set up to be self-contained, so that one may enter anytime.
