

and Letters of Henrietta Szold," a portrait of the founder of Hadassah, the women's Zionist Organization of America.

Another important work of Mr. Lowenthal is "The Jews of Germany, a Story of Sixteen Centuries," which received critical acclaim for its stirring account of Jewish experiences in Germany prior to the rise of Hitler, and the position of the Jews in Germany today.

Mr. Lowenthal also is the author of "A World Passed By," the first comprehensive book in any language on Jewish antiquities in Europe and North Africa, "Our Fathers That Begat Us," an imaginative genealogy which carries his family history back to Abraham, "The Memoirs of Gluckel of Hamelin," a first translation of this classic into English, and as his most recent work, he is co-author of "This Was New York-The Nation's Capital in 1789."

Mr. Lowenthal is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and Harvard University. A frequent guest speaker on the Columbia Broadcasting System program, "Invitation to Learning," he is also the former director of the Zionist Bureau of the Pacific Coast, and associate editor of the Menorah Journal. He represented Jewish minority interests in the League of Nations, and was Secretary of the World Conference for International Peace Through Religion, and an Editor of the New International Year Book.

Mr. Lowenthal's appearance at the Center is part of our Center's observance of the Tercentenary of American Jewry and was arranged by our Adult Activities Committee and Philip Lown, president of the American Association of Jewish Education.

Youth Week Acclaimed By President Eisenhower

President Dwight D. Eisenhower said today that Jewish Youth Week "serves to remind the entire nation of the contribution which Jewish people have made to the development of the United States." Jewish Youth Week, to be observed from March 18 to 25, is an annual project of the National Jewish Welfare Board-sponsored National Jewish Youth Conference, the largest representative body of (Continued on page 4) J. D. C. AID YOUTH ALIYAH PROGRAM

The Joint Distribution Committee and Youth Aliyah of the Jewish Agency have reached an agreement whereby JDC will help to subsidize the preliminary training of North African boys and girls in France before they leave for Israel, it was announced in Paris last week by Moses W. Beckelman, JDC Director-General.

The youngsters selected by Youth Aliyah will be taken to the Herbert H. Lehman Home in Cambous, near Montpelier, in the southern part of France where, for a minimum of three months, they will be provided with instruction in Hebrew, geography, Israel history and agriculture. They will raise their own fruits and vegetables on farm plots totalling 50 acres. After their preliminary training they will leave for Israel where they will be assigned to Youth Aliyah institutions and agricultural settlements. The Jewish Agency and JDC are both beneficiaries of funds raised in the United States by the United Jewish Appeal.

The Herbert H. Lehman Home is a children's village which was set up by JDC three years ago at a cost of approximately \$250,000. Both the climate and soil of the region approximate conditions that the newcomers will find when they arrive in Israel. The village is administered by Youth Aliyah and currently houses 250 boys and girls ranging from 13 to 16 years of age. In addition to financial grants for maintenance of the children in the village, JDC will also provide food supplies from surplus stocks of the United States Department of Agriculture.

U. J. A. Initial Pledges Soar To New Record

An all-time record for support of a philanthropic cause was set here this week as the United Jewish Appeal got its 1955 nationwide campaign under way with \$17,650,000 in individual contributions. The campaign opening came at the close of a three-day national inaugural conference.

This record-breaking figure represents gifts pledged and is the result of a strenuous pre-campaign solicitation of larger contributions that has been carried on since the first of the year.

William Rosenwald, general chairman of the UJA, hailed this outpouring of gifts as "a dramatic and unprecedented response to human needs." He pointed out at the same time that the \$17,650,000 in gifts tops a more than \$14,000,000 campaign opening total of two years ago and that contributions this year "acted almost to a man in giving more than they did in 1953 and '54."

Avraham Harman, Israel's Consul General in New York, told more than the 600 campaign leaders that "Israel is surrounded by countries marked by internal instability, in which parliamentary institutions have given way to military dictatorships or degenerated into impotence." In contrast, he said, "Israel has successfully maintained its democratic character and stability and has been developing its institutions upon the basis of the rule of law and justice."

Mr. Harman, in the major address at the closing session, stated that in seven years "Israel has emerged from the stage of improvisation and is today a solid and unshakable part of the Middle East scene." In its next seven years, he stated, Israel faces the two-fold task of realizing its goal of economic self-reliance and of "continuing to offer homes and rehabilitation to Jews striving to come to Israel."
