Words of Torah from Rabbi Saks

This Shabbat is also the first day of the fall harvest festival of Sukkot. There are three harvest festivals in our calendar: Passover, Shavuot, and Sukkot. When the Temple stood in Jerusalem, each was a pilgrimage festival. For each, there is an agricultural, a historical, and a theological theme.For Passover, they are the spring harvest, our redemption from Egypt, and the longing for the ultimate redemption. For Shavuot, they are the late spring harvest, our standing at Mount Sinai, and God's having revealed Torah to us



so that we can share its message with the world. For Sukkot, they are the fall harvest, our wandering in the wilderness, and God's creation of the world.

In the Torah reading for the first day of Sukkot, we read, "On the first day you shall take the product of *hadar* trees, branches of palm trees, boughs of leafy trees, and willow of the brook, and you shall rejoice before the Eternal your God seven days" (Lev. 23:40). These four types of produce are the *etrog* (citron) and the *lulav*, the latter of which is comprised of a palm branch, myrtle branches, and willow branches. Various sources in Jewish tradition identify these four products as symbols of our bodies. The etrog's shape evokes the heart. The palm branch evokes the spine. The shape of the myrtle's leaves remind us of eyes. And the shape of the willow's leaves remind us of lips. As we take the etrog and lulav into our hands, we remind ourselves to strive to praise God with our whole bodies, with the intention of our hearts, through our physical actions, by seeing God in the world, and through song and speech. Sukkot calls us to use our whole selves to see and represent God's presence in the world.

Bernstein Memorial Scholar

Each year, the Rosalyne S. and Sumner T. Bernstein Memorial Scholar-In-Residence program makes it possible for us to bring a leading figure in the Jewish world to our synagogue for study and celebration. This year, we will welcome (on Zoom) Professor Marc Dollinger, author of *Black Power, Jewish Politics: Reinventing the Alliance In the 1960s.*

Jews, Whiteness, Power, and Privilege October 22 at 7:00 PM

In this talk, which is focused more on sociology than history, Dr. Dollinger will define "whiteness," give an overview of Jewishness and whiteness since the late 19th century, and help frame some of the larger questions of power and privilege in an American Jewish context. The talk will explore the vocabulary and assumptions of social justice movements today.

1619, 1654, 2020: Jews and Racism October 29 at 7:00 PM

We will explore the documents in a primary source reader that Dr. Dollinger co-edited with Gary Zola get to the heart of American Jewish support, complicity, and benefit from institutional racism. This talk will be a deep dive into the ways that Jews, as whites, have succeeded in the U.S. because of institutional racism. This is talk for people who want the most direct and honest assessment of the current national climate.
