Call someone you haven't spoken to in a month and tell them you love them. It's 44 degrees and sunny. Get outside if you can. Reb Nachman of Bratzlav taught, "The Architect of the Universe creates anew each day. Therefore each day is an utterly new creation. Take as much as you can from what each day has to offer."

Today has a lot to offer. Take it all in. I'll be here on the other side. So will you.
