



# A Message from Rabbi Saks

Many of us are familiar with the midrash, the rabbinic legend of Abraham setting out from his father Terach's house to found what has come to be the first monotheistic

tradition in the world. Before he sets out, according to the *midrash*, Terach asks his son to keep an eye on the store while Terach runs an errand. The store is an idol shop, specializing in statues of a variety of designs which the local



Maimonides in *The Guide to the Perplexed* teaches that the original idol worshippers knew that there was only one God. The idol worshippers weren't worshipping the stone statues; they were using them as an intermediary between themselves and God. The idols did not represent God, but

represented the things and people in the world that were liaisons between the people and God. It is because Judaism holds the belief that we do not need an

> intermediary to reach God that the use of such an intermediary would constitute idolatry.

> Unlike other religious traditions, where the clergy is closer to God, more connected to God, or can speak for God, Judaism holds that each of us is equally

close to God. The role of the rabbi is primarily as teacher to enable the direct connection between each individual and When I lead God. the congregation in worship, my role is not to represent God, but rather to help each of you connect with God more directly, to remove any sense of a liaison, rather than to create it. Judaism has always employed the use knowledgeable lay people in the worship process, because each of us has a personal connection to God and can help facilitate that experience for others as well.


The gabbai is one of these lay roles in Jewish worship. An Aramaic term, gabbai originally meant a tax collector. In the context of worship, a gabbai has come to be known specifically as the person who assists with the reading of Torah and as someone who helps to make sure that worship runs smoothly. Many synagogues have ritual committees, but one of the first things that I admired about Bet

Ha'am is that we have a *Gabbai* Committee, a group of individuals invested in the worship process at Bet Ha'am who aid the rabbi in making decisions about worship and finding lay service leaders when needed, among other tasks.

Each of Bet Ha'am's previous rabbis has engaged the Gabbai Committee differently. I have come to learn that our Gabbai Committee can best serve me and Bet Ha'am by providing space and atmosphere in which we can experiment with different forms of Jewish worship, explore various musical and liturgical settings, and try out new and innovative approaches to Jewish prayer. To achieve this goal, it is my intention to use our Gabbai Committee as a laboratory space, one in which we can work together to learn what is possible in Jewish worship and take it for a test drive that allows us to offer reflections and critique. The Gabbai Committee welcomes new members and I hope that anyone with an interest or inquisitiveness about Jewish worship will attend our meetings. Our next meeting will be held on Thursday, December 19, at 6:30 PM. I'll include the topic for our meeting in the weekly emails before the meeting and hope that you'll consider joining the group. Together we can deepen our worship at Bet Ha'am and help one another foster a direct connection with God.

# President's Message - Lisa Munderback

Thank you to all of you who shared your thoughts with me through phone calls, emails and face-to-face conversations about my article in the November *Chadashot* regarding clarifying the role of non-Jewish members of Bet Ha'am. It was gratifying that so many of you responded. I realized from these communications that the issue had not been as thoroughly explored through our strategic planning



The comments I received were passionate and reflect a wide diversity of opinion. Before we proceed with a specific policy, we all need to hear and explore each other's thoughts, experiences, feelings and ideas. Some of you spoke of family members who do not feel fully welcomed because they were not asked to teach despite their active involvement in Religious School and Bet Ha'am. Others expressed having difficulty understanding why our members who have not - or not yet - chosen to become Jewish would expect to be treated the same as our Jewish members. Some are amenable to having non-Jews serve on the Board, but not as officers. Others are fearful that we will lose what makes us a Jewish religious entity.

Our by-laws indicate that any member in good standing can participate fully in congregational life, and yet we have members who don't feel fully included. We need to examine how to meet our goal to be a welcoming community for all of



our members with our other goals as a Reform Jewish synagogue. One issue we haven't been clear about is who can or cannot serve in leadership positions. I'm sure there are also other concerns. We need to ask to find out what they are. Asking the hard questions will lead us to delve more deeply into who we are and where we want to be as a Reform Jewish synagogue community. We need to do more listening and learning. For

now, let's all take a deep breath.

The Executive Committee will be working on a process to engage the congregation in continued dialogue. Our commitment as a Board is to do this in ways that will be respectful of all points of view. This will take some time. I want to assure you that we can and will work this through within our Bet Ha'am community. If you are anxious about how difficult these conversations may be, I hope you will share your feelings with respect, and that others will follow suit.

I encourage you to come with me on this journey. It may be difficult, but I have confidence that we will be a stronger community as a result.

For example, we were recently recognized as one of 50 Stunning Synagogues From Around the World by Huffington Post: <a href="http://">http://</a>



We occasionally have requests for tours or walk-throughs from people who include interested architects, engaged couples planning a wedding, folks driving by who are intrigued by the architecture and folks visiting their hometown who used to attend school in the Religious School building. A perhaps lesser honor came a few years ago when we made a national list of top places for secret skateboarding!

Various groups and organizations are hearing about our beautiful space and have interest in booking events here. All opportunities are considered carefully to ensure that we stay true to our purpose as well as our financial overhead costs. We also think about how we can serve the greater local community. Bookings this past year included day-long corporate events, a weekend bridge tournament and a local police department meeting. Interestingly, we are enjoying so many meetings and events of our own that it can sometimes be a challenge to find available meeting space to welcome these other groups.

Our garden has a growing fan base, as well. Two local churches recently expressed interest in touring the garden and consulting with our committee as they embark on their own community gardens. We even had a call last year from a rabbi in Florida who had heard about our wheat project.

The Bet Ha'am website is becoming an increasingly important resource for people who are visiting or new to the area. When they contact us, we match them up with volunteers to greet them when they visit so that they are personally welcomed and can learn more about Bet Ha'am. The Membership Committee is extending this concept through their SynaGuide program, which connects volunteer congregants with new members in a buddy system.

We continue to promote and welcome the interest in both our facility as well as the unique spark that makes Bet Ha'am such a special place to be.

- Filling Words with Light: Hasidic and Mystical Reflections on Jewish Prayer, co-authored with Lawrence Kushner.
- The Rebbe's Daughter, the story of Malkah Shapiro who grew up in Poland, the daughter of a noted Hasidic master. This is a rare glimpse of the world of the Hasidic Jew in pre-World War | Eastern Europe.


