In Tractate B'rachot 27b-28a in the Talmud, the community gathers to appoint a new leader. After much deliberation, approach Rabbi Eleazer ben Azariah, determining him to be the right person because of three qualities: he is wise, rich and tenth in descent from Ezra.

These qualities might raise some eyebrows for us now, and we know that they did for the rabbis of the *Talmud*, too, because they

offer explanations for each of these qualities. It was important that their leader be wise so that if anyone put a question to him, he would be able to answer it. Lisa

incredible *Purim* carnival that will make its appearance next year after being snowed out this time around.

The rabbis in the Talmud wanted their new leader to be rich, so he would be able to pay court to Caesar, if needed. Their new leader's wealth was not about the money that he would have, but rather his ability to offer protection and security for his community. Lisa's dedicated work with the volunteer leaders in our congregation has protected us and ensured our future. Whenever a need has come up, if Lisa wasn't the one to get the job done, she immediately engaged the people who could. She has built a strong community of volunteers and leaders in our congregation and we stronger because of her.

The final quality that the rabbis of the *Talmud* valued in their leader

was his descent from Ezra. His ancestral merit demonstrated his commitment to the community. Lisa's involvement in congregation did not begin with her presidency. She has been a dedicated volunteer and leader for many years and, thankfully, will continue to be someone on whom we can count for many years forward. Her dedication to Congregation Bet Ha'am has never been about the titles she has held, but rather about the love she has for our congregation.

Summer is almost here. The 2012-2013 school year is over. The children will have a long break from doing something Jewish on Sundays. But, as you will not be surprised, I encourage parents to continue to do many Jewish things even though school is not in session.

Many families have their own Jewish traditions, practices and values.

Here are a few new ideas to try:

- Share books with Jewish themes or by Jewish authors with your children.
- Continue using the daily blessings your children have learned, such as the blessings before eating different kinds of food.
- Say the Shema with your child before bedtime.
- Use the on-line center at Behrman House.org with your fourth or sixth grader to practice reading in Hebrew.
- Find more information about the summer holidays such as *Tisha B'Av* (the 9th day of *Av*, which falls on July 16 this year), which commemorates the destruction of both Temples in Jerusalem.
- Review the Hebrew letters with younger children and practice them to build fluency.
- Practice reading Hebrew and prayers with fourth, fifth and sixth graders.
- Attend services to celebrate Shabbat or celebrate Shabbat at home.
- Find a family *Tikun Olam* project to work on together this summer.
- Talk with your child about the Jewish things you do during the week.
- Play Jewish games as a family— we have some available in our gift shop.

Maggie Butler, M.S.W. and Joanne Turnbull, Ph.D., co-founders of Your Write Mind, P.A., are certified and experienced Amherst Writers & Artists (AWA) Workshop Leaders. The AWA method is designed to help individuals express what is most meaningful to them in a safe, nonjudgmental environment. Participants will have the support they need to record and share experiences that communicate who they really are.

Participation is limited to 24. There will be two groups of twelve writers. One workshop will be offered in the morning, the other in the evening. The evening workshop will be held at Bet Ha'am and is tentatively scheduled for Wednesdays. Time and location of the morning workshop will be announced soon.

When the workshop series ends, writers will select one or two favorite pieces for inclusion in a chapbook (a small book) of legacy letters. Writers will also be invited to read their work at Bet Ha'am during Sukkot. In addition, the Jewish Museum will
