A Message from Rabbi Saks

As I am writing this, we are in the midst of our four autumn holidays that fall during the Hebrew month of *Tishrei*. I am reminded of a *midrash* on the four species that together create the *Julav*.

This *midrash* describes the species as different types of Jewish learners. The *etrog*, which has both a good taste and a pleasant aroma, is like one who both possesses Jewish knowledge and also performs *mitzvot*. The palm branch, which comes from a date-palm and has flavor but

no aroma, is like the one who has knowledge but does not perform *mitzvot*. The myrtle branches, which have aroma, but no flavor, are like the one who performs *mitzvot*, but has no *Torah* knowledge. Finally, the willow, which lacks both smell and taste, epitomizes the one who neither has Jewish knowledge nor performs *mitzvot*.

Reform Judaism, rooted in the premise of informed choice, requires us to become knowledgeable members of the Jewish community as we decide how to practice Judiasm. We are fortunate to have many talented teachers in our community and many opportunities for you to deepen your Jewish knowledge. I want to share some of the wonderful adult learning opportunities that are available to you at Bet Ha'am. You can read about all of our adult learning opportunities by picking up this year's brochure at the office or by contacting the office.

Let me begin with a few ongoing classes. These require no previous knowledge or advanced preparation and are a great way to dip your toes in the sea of Jewish learning. Each Saturday morning at 9:00 AM, I lead a Shabbat Torah study on the weekly portion. Our conversation is guided by

> both classical and contemporary texts that help us understand the relevance of an ancient text in our 21st century lives. I'm also happy we offer a monthly study opportunity with Rabbi Alice Goldfinger, a member of our congregation and our former rabbi. On the third Friday of each month at noon, Rabbi Goldfinger

teaches a Poetry of Talmud class, which pairs passages from the Talmud with poetry from later periods and a variety of cultures. Both of these classes afford you the opportunity to come to any individual class and not worry about what was taught at a previous session or will be covered in the future. I hope you'll try them!

There are also a few short-term opportunities coming up in November and December that should be on your radar. On three Thursday evenings at 7:00 PM in November (7, 14, & 21), we will offer our semi-annual Beit Midrash. You can sign up to attend three sessions of one class, three weeks in a row. In the past, we have offered Jewish cooking, Reel Theology (theological encounters in popular culture), classes on the Jewish idea of the messiah, and so much more. On the weekend of December 6-8, we will welcome Dr. Nehemia Polen, this year's Bernstein Scholar-in-Residence. Dr. Polen is a faculty member at Hebrew College and is a leading expert in Hasidism and Jewish thought. Each of

these offerings provides you with intense study but only a short commitment. I hope you will mark your calendar to save the dates for both.

Finally, I will offer an Introduction to Judaism course beginning in January 2014. This course is designed for new and renewed Jewish learners. Though some who enroll will be considering conversion, this is by no means a conversion course. It is open to anyone who wants to develop his or her Jewish knowledge beyond the basic level. We will explore Jewish history, life cycle, holidays and rituals, theology, and so much more. If you are curious about Judaism or know someone who is, please contact the office. I plan to meet with prospective students in October and November and set a mutually convenient schedule to begin our studies in January 2014.

It is said that Rabbi Akiva, one of the great rabbis of the Talmud, who was compared to Moses in his command of Judaism, didn't learn a thing about Judaism until he was 40 years old. At the age of 40, his wife encouraged him to engage with Judaism and he went on to become one of the greatest teachers that we've ever known. He is said to have realized, after seeing water dripping on a rock, that even though the water only fell drop by drop, it had eroded the rock. He recalled a verse from Job, "Water wears down rock," (Job 14:19) and this became his motto. Rabbi Akiva said, "If water can wear down a stone, then every member of the Jewish community can and will study Torah." It is never too late to deepen your Jewish knowledge.

The month of Tishrei is almost over as I write this: Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Simchat Torah. I don't think we could possibly fit another holiday in there. I don't know about you, but I'm exhausted from the introspection, the worship and the communal gatherings. And yet, I am refreshed. The same things that have left me physically drained have spiritually renewed me. How can this be?

Sacred spaces: worshiping in the sanctuary, Oneg and Kiddush in the social hall, meetings in the library, walking the Eastern Trail at Scarborough Marsh, kayaking at Panther Pond, welcoming friends into our home, laughing together. In the quiet of silent prayer, in the joyous singing, in the adult education class in the *sukkah*, in the warm hugs and smiles of all of you, I have been in sacred spaces.

When I am at Bet Ha'am, I am in a sacred space. This is not just because of its curved ceiling, windows that let in the sunlight, beautiful garden and reflecting pool, and simplicity of the ark and *bimah*. It is also because of all of you. At Shabbat services, a Bar or Bat Mitzvah celebration, an adult education class, Religious School, weeding the garden, and even at meetings, Bet Ha'am is a sacred community. We call the divine presence to be with us when we gather together.

I feel re-created when I am out kayaking, paddling near loons who are fishing or turtles who are basking in the sun on logs. I feel renewed when I am out walking and hear and see the amazing variety of birds, flowers, trees and



animals. I know I am in a sacred space, I feel the divine presence, and I am in awe when I am in nature.

A sacred space is where the eternal is present. I believe the eternal is within us and all around us if we are just open to its presence with all of our senses. I see, hear and feel it when the wind moves the leaves of the trees. I see and hear it when the rain flows off the roof into the reflecting pool. I see it when the sunlight reflects off the water onto the sanctuary ceiling. I hear it in the harmony of our voices as we sing prayers of peace. I smell it when I bend my nose to a beach rose, when it rains and when there is an ocean breeze. I taste it when I eat the challah on Shabbat, the apples and honey of Rosh Hashanah and the good food we have at potlucks, especially that first bite of Break-Fast at the end of Yom Kippur.

A sacred space is wherever and whenever we are. We will recognize it when we have an open attitude. The prayer I most often murmur during silent meditation is, "Holy One, give me a quiet heart and help me to hear the still, small voice within me. It calls me to come close to You and to grow in Your likeness."

My hope for all of us in these days after the High Holy Days is to be more aware of the divine presence in ourselves, each other and in the world - and to grow in its likeness.

Learning to read Hebrew can be an easy task for some and a difficult one for others. We each approach learning with our own strengths, styles and habits.

Over the years, many parents have shared with me that they do not read Hebrew and cannot help their children with their Hebrew learning. We have some resources that can be helpful to you if you have

never learned Hebrew or have forgotten what you learned in years past. If you have a student in third grade, we send a transliteration of the Hebrew materials home along with a CD for parents to use with their children. There is also a simple and helpful website that one of our new students (who is older) has used successfully this fall. I was impressed that he had mastered the first four lessons independently after only a few weeks. I encourage you to take a look at the *Shalom U'Vracha* book (www.behrmanhouse.com/learn/hebrew) if you want to learn to read Hebrew or refresh your Hebrew reading skills!

This year, all of our fourth, fifth and sixth graders will use the Behrman House on-line center (OLC) as part of their Hebrew studies. We are hoping that the variety of motivating activities available through this website will help our students increase their Hebrew reading fluency and have fun learning.

Under the big roof...

Many of you come to services and events at our beautiful synagogue. Visitors continue to revel in the beauty of our facility and grounds. We are so fortunate to enjoy this wonderful space, which is now over four years old.

The office and maintenance staff and several volunteers bustle to keep our building safe and in good shape. Routine fire inspections, sporadic maintenance, capital improvements (as our budget allows) and the daily cleaning and upkeep keep us busy "behind the scenes." Our goal is to keep our facility beautiful and clean, while also planning ways to reduce our expenses in the future.

In the past year, we gradually upgraded our building security and risk management program, partly in reaction to two breakins. One break-in occurred last fall and our *tzedakah* box was unfortunately destroyed. The other incident was an attempted entry through a roof panel just prior to our High Holy Days this year.

We are striving to improve basic security practices without affecting the comfort of Bet Ha'am as our community's spiritual home. Safety enhancements over the past year included:

- installing additional motion sensors to our internal and external security system,
- adding telephones in key locations,
- installing video cameras,
- posting caution signs for local youngsters who might be tempted to skateboard or trespass,
- limiting unnecessary use of external doors and changing some external door locks,
- installing panic buttons,
- posting a local police officer to moderate traffic and facilitate pedestrian crossing during the High Holy Days and
- working with our security response team and the local police to help streamline our internal processes and to educate us on overall safety practices.

As you continue to enjoy the welcoming loveliness of our synagogue, know that we will continue to plan well and work hard to maintain its impressive glory now and into our future generations.

It breaks down the barrier between leader and listener. Its improvisational and experimental nature make it a fun, yet strangely deep, game to play - for both adults and children.
