A Message from Rabbi Saks

There's a lesser-known holiday that falls during the middle of May this year, beginning at sundown on Saturday, May 17. Two-thirds of the way from Passover to Shavuot on the symbolic journey between our redemption from Egypt and our receiving Torah at Sinai, we mark a holiday called Lag b'Omer. Lag b'Omer gets its name from the counting of days that begins on the second night of Passover and lasts until the eve of Shavuot. This period of counting is known as the Omer, which in our agricultural history was the preparation for the barley harvest celebrated at Shavuot. (Omer means sheaf and refers to a sheaf of barley.) The word lag is an indication of the number of days counted up until this point. It is comprised of the Hebrew letters lamed (which represents the number 30) and gimel (which represents the number 3). Lag b'Omer is the 33rd day in the counting of the Omer from Passover to Shavuot.

Generally, the period of the Omer is a mournful period, marked by some of the traditional practices of mourning, prohibition of haircuts and shaving, listening to certain types of music and holding or attending weddings. Legend tells us that during the counting of the Omer in the second century, a plague killed 24,000 students of Rabbi Akiva. We are also told that the plague finally lifted on Lag b'Omer, which is why this day became a holiday.

It is also understood that our ancestors who left Egypt were not ready to receive the *Torah*. We

regret that even though our ancestors had their freedom, their mental states were not such that they were prepared to receive the Torah just yet. If we remember the story from the book of Exodus, we recall that the Israelites were not content with their freedom during their wandering. In the wilderness with Moses, they asked to go back to Egypt, where they thought the food was better. They lacked gratitude for the manna provided for them and begged for meat instead. They fought with Moses and they fought with one another.

The rabbis express great concern when the Jewish community faces internal conflict. We remember as we count the Omer that fighting within the Jewish community would be enough to prevent us from receiving Torah. They tell us that it was infighting in our communities that led to the destruction of the first and second Temples in Jerusalem. They also tell us that this was either a result of Divine punishment or not being able to get organized to defend ourselves because we were so consumed with our conflicts with one another.

I recently encountered this poem by Merle Feld that reminds us of the power we possess and how our words and actions can hurt or heal, to paraphrase Rabbi Joseph Telushkin. The result all depends in how we use them.

Last week in the supermarket at an unlikely hour I saw a woman I know. She tried to avoid me pretended not to remember me but I had unwittingly trapped her blocked her escape in the tuna fish aisle.

I just wanted to say hello my cruelty was inadvertent but up close I saw her hair was in disarray and dirty, her face without its careful mask of lipstick, blusher, shadow. She was wearing a ratty old jacket the discard of her husband or perhaps her teenaged son.

Nine thirty, on a Tuesday morning, dressed like that – suddenly I knew she was out of work and ashamed. And coming undone there in the tuna fish aisle.

I tried as best I could to help her cover her nakedness but all that day and the next she haunted me. How strange, I thought, how strange and how sad that she should feel threatened, judged, shamed by me.

The rabbis say
when you bring color to
someone's face
it's as if you shed their blood.
Forgive me.
May you be restored to your full
self
Soon, speedily, in our day.
And let us say amen.

As we count our way from Passover to *Shavuot* and recall the journey of our ancestors in the wilderness, may we learn from their trials and tribulations and create a more peaceful journey towards *Torah* together.

President's Message - Lisa Munderback

Last month I shared that the past few Board meetings had focused on finances and, in particular, the costs of Religious School. The Board believes that it is within our mission and values to support religious education of the children of Bet Ha'am. Providing opportunities for worship, lifelong learning, social action and other activities to strengthen the Jewish

community are also parts of our mission. Because school fees have only covered one-third of the school cost, the Board approved a fee increase and a change in the fees that teachers pay for their own children. The congregation as a whole will still be absorbing about half of the cost of Reliaious School.

This month I'd like to share information about the congregational budget as a whole. As is true for most non-profits, our biggest expense (61% of our budget) is for salaries and benefits. The cost of utilities and maintenance is another 15%. Telephone, internet, copying, supplies and other office expenses account for 4%. Programming costs are 8% and our dues to the URJ are 7% of our budget. This year we had some significant technology purchases that were 3% of our total expenses. The remaining 2% of our expenditures are for professional services and other miscellaneous expenses.

On the revenue side, our membership dues account for 66% of our income. School fees provide an additional 8%. About 7% of our revenue this year came from donations restricted for particular purposes, e.g., technology, Bernstein Scholar-in-Residence, and an additional 7% came from unrestricted donations and fundraising. JCA's generous grant to support our Religious School provided 3% of our revenue, and gifts from foundations were much higher this year and accounted for another 7%. Income generated from rental of our facilities brought in almost 1% of revenue, and proceeds from the Judaica shop provided much of the final 1%.



Our reliance on dues for two-thirds of our revenue is not surprising given our relatively short tenure as a congregation. Many older synagogues have significant endowment income. Because of our reliance on dues, it is important that we have a system that is comfortable for our members. We have had a "fair share" system for many years and ask each member family to give

1.75% of income. We don't ask for verification of income and we make allowances for those whose circumstances don't allow for the full amount. We rely on those who can give more to make up the difference.

The current issue of Reform Judaism magazine includes an interesting article that focuses on the decisions that congregations make about dues. Many congregations use the "flat fee" model. Others, like us, use the "fair share" model. There are a few Reform congregations experimenting with a "free will" dues system. The article emphasizes that dues systems only succeed if members feel engaged and want to financially support the synagogue. There are so many other organizations vying for our time and money.

Our Board, staff, teachers and many volunteers all work hard to create a welcoming, vibrant Reform Jewish community here in Southern Maine. From worship and lifelong learning to gardening and socializing, Bet Ha'am strives to engage all our members and welcome those who are not members. Please let me know how we can better support your involvement in our Reform Jewish community and what you would be interested in learning about and reading in this column. We want you to feel that Bet Ha'am is your go-to place. Hopefully Bet Ha'am will be at the top of your priority list for dues, donations and time.

A congregant recently brought me a copy of a Bet Ha'am Membership Directory from between sixteen and twenty years ago. We've had such fun poring through the photographs of former and current staff members and congregants!

A young, bright-eyed family with a couple of toddlers now has two college students. Sure,

the adults in the photos have changed and aged a bit, as we a l do, but the most striking evolution is that of the children, who are now the young adults in our congregation.

Trends across the country indicate that congregations continue to see a drop in membership among young adults. There often is a gap of engagement after their b'nai mitzvah until those young adults are in their late twenties or thirties. We continue to look for strategies to retain interest among our youth and young adults. In fact, one focus of our Strategic Plan is to find more engaging ways for current and new congregants of all ages and lifestyles to explore their connections to Judaism, their peers, and the overall Bet Ha'am community.

We continue to thoughtfully plan lifelong learning and engagement opportunities that include programs and social events for young adults who may not have had religious school experiences; exciting concerts, speaker series, and other programs open to the greater community; volunteer opportunities and social action initiatives; and events that bring together <u>different</u> generations and foster a deeper sense of community.

Bet Ha'am realizes that successful programming only occurs when people actually participate, so we are paying attention to how we use communication geared toward different generations. For young adults this includes social media such as Facebook, Twitter, blogging and online videos. We will be rolling out some new initiatives along with our new website in the months to come.

I was so pleased to have met the two young college students, the former toddlers in the photograph, when they were home on break. They continue to be active members of our congregation - volunteering, engaging their peers and representing Bet Ha'am well as they begin their adult lives. Let's think about how we can keep the Bet Ha'am spirit alive in a I of our young members as they transition into adulthooc and possibly begin their own families. Perhaps one day they will be back with us, some with their own small children, smiling for the camera!

Gerda is the co-founder of Citizenship Counts, which empowers young people to be responsible, participatory and socially-just citizens.
