A Message from Rabbi Saks

Early in the Passover seder, at the beginning of the Maggid section (the telling of the Passover story), we note the

matzah on the table and recite the words of Ha Lachma Anya: This is the bread of poverty and persecution that our ancestors ate in the land of Egypt.... Let all who are hungry come and eat. Let all who are in need come and share in the Passover

meal. We also ask the four questions that alert us to the things that make Passover different from other nights of the year. But for many, the night of Passover will be no different than any other night of the year.

MAZON: A Jewish Response to Hunger urges us to ask a fifth question at our Passover Seder tables this year: Why on this night are millions of people still going hungry? According to MAZON, hunger in America is at an epidemic level. Fifty million Americans – nearly one in six – struggle to put enough nutritious food on the table every day. One of every five Israelis can't be sure when or if they'll have their next meal. At Passover, when the celebration of our freedom centers around food more than any other holiday, we have an opportunity to be

even more keenly aware of the hunger of others.

The story of Passover is the

central narrative of our tradition. Every time we raise a cup of wine at Shabbat or at a festival, we remember that God freed us from Egpyt. Thirty-six times, Torah reminds us to care for the widow, the orphan and the stranger (the Torah's

way of identifying the weakest members of society) and we know the heart of the stranger, having been strangers to Pharaoh in Egypt. We cannot fully celebrate our freedom when we haven't ensured that others are also free. Being free means having the power to make decisions for oneself, without any constraint. One who doesn't know where his or her next meal is coming from isn't truly free.

When we ask MAZON's question at our Passover seder, we begin a conversation about why there is a hunger crisis that persists in our world and what we can do individually and collectively to solve it. Part of our congregation's observance of Yom Kippur includes collecting food and funds for local food pantries

and for MAZON. We cannot restrict those efforts to only one time each year. Attention to the hunger of others needs to be on our radar at all times, in every season of our Jewish year. In a culture whose observance of holidays is so focused on food, we need to remember that there are far too many without enough food.

Please take time to learn more about MAZON's Fifth Question campaign by visiting http:// www.mazon.org/fifthquestion. Raise the fifth question at your Passover seder, discuss what steps vou can take individually and brainstorm ideas that we, the Bet Ha'am community. can take together to end hunger. Rabbi Tarfon teaches us in Pirke Avot that though the task is great and the day is short, and though we cannot complete the work ourselves, we are not free to sit on the sidelines and do nothing. We have to do what we can, because when we participate, together we can end hunger.

of Religious School is offset by a substantial grant of about \$110 per student from the Jewish Community Alliance. The reality is that all members, through dues and other donations, are subsidizing an average of \$640, or almost two thirds of the cost for each student.

This is the time of year when we

clean our homes of *chametz* and also look at the spiritual or emotional *chametz* that might be weighing us down. It's a time to sweep out the cobwebs, literally and figuratively. It's also a good opportunity to sort through closets and drawers and set aside items for Goodwill, Preble Street, Hope House and other organizations that need clothes, household goods and toiletries for their clients.

And, it's also tax season. If we haven't finished, this means locating all the pertinent information and doing all the work to submit our tax returns. I rather begrudge spending those precious hours on taxes instead of something fun.

Our Board of Trustees looks even more closely at our budget and expenditures at this time of year to determine how the fiscal year will end and to develop a budget for the next fiscal year. We are fortunate that our treasurer and Finance Committee members are astute and are asking probing questions as they draft a budget proposal to present to the Board.

The past couple of Board meetings have focused on finances, especially Religious School. This year we have 145 students. Though the cost to provide religious education for each child is about \$1000 per year, families pay \$370 for the first child and \$270 for the second child. We have waived the tuition for parents who volunteer to teach Religious School and we provide scholarships for families who cannot afford the fees. Some of the cost

The Board believes that this practice is not financially sustainable. We feel that more of the cost of Religious School needs to be funded through school fees. For the 2014-2015 school year, tuition will be increased to \$400 for each student, and teachers will pay \$200 for each of their children in Religious School. We will waive tuition for children of new teachers during their first year of teaching, and we will continue to provide scholarships for those families who are unable to pay the full tuition. The members of the congregation will continue to support about half of the cost of Religious School; the JCA grant and family tuition payments will also support about half of the program. We feel that this plan will be better for the overall financial health of the congregation.

Our Religious School will still be a great value – in many ways! We are excited about adopting the recommendations of the Religious School Change Task Force that will make our Religious School even better and more accessible for more families. And, we continue to strive to increase membership and the number of families who participate in and help financially support our exceptional program.

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From the Executive Director Kris Dorer

Spring is upon us, and friends from Bet Ha'am and our southern Maine community are busy planning b'nai mitzvah celebrations, weddings, birthday and anniversary parties, corporate meetings, fundraisers and other events. Is there someone you

know who might consider Bet Ha'am for their upcoming event?

Congregation Bet Ha'am offers a gorgeous, accessible facility with a layout and location that rival meeting and banquet spaces throughout the area. The social hall can seat 150 people for a meal or 200 theater-style. For larger events, we can open up the wall to accommodate hundreds in various configurations. Our commercial kitchen is Serv-Safe certified, and the City of South Portland allows us to rent it to bakers and other chefs. Our library is often available for smaller meetings and our school offers ready-made classroom space for larger corporate events.

Planners can also count on our service-oriented staff to help them - from planning to on-site hospitality on the day of the event. We are experienced in working with caterers, busy individuals and families to help them feel comfortable and confident about their celebration or event.

We are also exploring opportunities to partner with community groups, nonprofit organizations and small businesses for rental of space on an ongoing basis. These groups might include day camps, after school programs, small preschools or child care, nonprofit organizations or other groups seeking safe space at reasonable rates.

The income from these events can raise revenue to support our operating budget. Please think creatively about opportunities to rent our facility and talk about Bet Ha'am whenever you can. This is an opportunity to open our doors to the larger community and show others the beauty and energy of our spiritual home.

From the Religious School Director Orly Mendelson Biggie



Pesach is just around the corner. Though Pesach always arrives on the fifteenth day of the Jewish month of Nisan, this year it is almost in the middle of April because we added an extra month of Adar for the leap year.

Growing up in Israel, I remember feeling the arrival of Pesach right after Purim. The shop owners try to sell all the non-Pesach food and start to stock Kosher for Passover food. Since the grocery shops do not sell chametz during Passover, any leftover chametz is covered with paper. The atmosphere everywhere is one of cleaning. I suppose Pesach cleaning is what we consider spring cleaning here, but cleaning for Pesach has more missions and must get rid of all the chametz in the home. I also remember how each year, after we had cleaned our house, there would be one or two sand storms that would bring sand in everywhere. The winds from the desert at this time of the year carry sand and dust into homes that are far from the desert, as was ours. So much for all that cleaning!

Memories of holidays are part of every person's identity. At Religious School, we try to enhance the lives of our students and families with rich positive memories. We help the students learn how to celebrate *Pesach* not only in our classrooms but also through a model seder every few years. This year we will have one model seder for students in first through third grades and another model seder for students in fourth through sixth grades. We hope that our students will help you incorporate some new traditions at your own sedareem (seders) to add to your family's traditions and activities. Songs, games, telling the story, food and fun all are part of seder traditions and help us create wonderful *Pesach* memories for our kids.

Strategic Plan Implementation Update

As a major step in the implementation of our Strategic Plan, the Board has approved a proposal for several innovations that will enhance our religious school. You'll find more details in the article on page 10 of this newsletter. Kudos to the members of the Religious School Change Task Force for their excellent work!

Enhancing opportunities for spirituallyengaging worship and ritual is another focus of the Strategic Plan. Working with the *Gabbai* committee, Rabbi Saks has begun to pilot several ideas. New melodies are joining our traditional tunes at weekly *Shabbat* services. Periods of meditative prayer and silence are also frequently interwoven in the service. On the heels of our weekend with Shira Kline, we look forward to creating a more frequent Tot *Shabbat* program for children five years old and younger and their families.

The recent Shabbat in Three Experiences allowed each participant to choose a study session, meditative service or traditional worship service and then join with the larger community for closing prayers and oneg treats. It was wonderful to see so many participants and to often see one family member in the discussion group or meditation service and the other choosing the traditional service. At the conclusion of services, the sanctuary was full and the *ruach* felt especially powerful. Many thanks to Rabbi Saks, Rebecca Wohl-Pollock, Jane Sloven, Joe Pye and Sharon and Perry Newman for making this *Shabbat* experiment so successful.

Enhancing the bar and bat mitzvah experience for our students and our community is another goal identified in the Strategic Plan. The School Change Task Force and the Board have endorsed exploring new initiatives to meet this goal. Working with the B'nai Mitzvah Revolution program that the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) has sponsored, Rabbi Saks and Orly Biggie are looking at options to allow students to tailor their experiences, while maintaining our focus on the b'nai mitzvah students being part of our larger community.

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Religious School Change Task Force Proposal

The Bet Ha'am Board recently approved the proposal below from the Religious School Change Task Force. The Task Force is appreciative of the input and insights it received from many in our congregation. The Task Force used the thoughtful and extensive feedback to determine that a hybrid plan including many of the proposed initiatives would be the best framework for our religious school in the coming school year. With the exception of the proposal for mid-week Hebrew instruction, which had little or no support in our community, the initiatives and the process were fairly well received. This proposal represents an initial step, and we anticipate review of the outcomes of these initiatives and consideration of additional changes in subsequent years.

Proposal:

The Religious School Change Task Force recommends to the Board that the Education Committee implement the following items for the 2014-2015 school year:

We recommend altering the schedule for grades 7-10, so that this group meets in the morning one Sunday per month and in the evening for the other Sundays.

On the monthly Sundays that all grades meet in the morning, we recommend a structured mentoring program with clear objectives involving older and younger students. Older students will have options for tasks, either working directly with younger kids, helping to plan programming for an all-ages activity or other appropriate activities.

The Task Force appreciates the desire of our older students in grades 7-10 to have social time built into their program that is separate from the younger grades. Once each trimester, this age group should have either a day-long *Shabbat* program or an overnight *Shul*-in instead of a Sunday evening - with dates being communicated at or before the beginning of each school year.

We recommend periodic special weekends (as with guest musicians, artists, etc.) and/or field trips to be pursued for all grades and open to the congregation as appropriate, depending on funding. We would like to see this happen at least annually, with an ideal of two to three times each year.

The hope of the Task Force is that by altering the structure of the program, we will increase the opportunities for interaction between congregational groups that traditionally do not overlap. We believe this interaction will encourage conversations at all age levels around the values and traditions and actions that matter, and that we will build a stronger community both among our religious school families and within the congregation as a whole.

In addition to the items above, we would like to charge the Education Committee with the following important assignments.

The Education Committee should re-examine how we interact with families who will miss large chunks of classroom attendance, so that we are offering options for make-up work that are meaningful and allow these families to continue to fully be a part of the congregational community.

We should begin to implement a creditbased system, either incrementally or fully. We want to move in the direction of encouraging and celebrating students and families who engage in Jewish life in a variety of ways - at an appropriate level for each grade with the oldest students having the

most flexibility and responsibility, and at an appropriate level for each student, particularly those with special needs who may engage with Jewish study in nontraditional ways

We recommend the Education Committee use any resources available through the URJ, NATE, and the *B'nai Mitzvah* Revolution Program to take a serious, critical look at our curriculum and to re-examine what we are offering at each grade level with an eye towards modifying our curriculum to focus on what's relevant for our kids and their families.

We recommend incorporating family learning and intergenerational learning into more of what we offer on a regular basis and planning regular programs that purposefully include other population segments within our congregation.

The Task Force encourages the Education Committee and the Board to continually push for excellence and to evaluate and reexamine our program structure and curriculum on a regular basis to make sure that we are responding to the current needs of our community. We urge the Education Committee to develop an ongoing evaluation and review process for every aspect of our program. We recommend continually seeking out best practices and periodically piloting new programs.
